A GREAT MISTAKE.

The Liverpool Times, which grewleed

and so lugubriously the lack of progress for the Allies apparent in their movements, has now been superseded by an article in the Times itself.

In an article dated at Paris, it assumes the ground that on this side of the Atlantic we are all agreed that the fall of Sebastianopol created a victory for the Allies. In the Standard, however, of the same date, there is a passage at least as forcible as that in the Times.

The Times' opinion that even if feeling exists towards the Allies existed in the States, it should be traced rather to the French than to any innate hostility to the British government.

The Times is at fault in its supposition in so far as facts, and especially in its failure to notice the numerous changes that have recently taken place.

First, the battle of Sevastopol did not give us any demonstrations whatever.

The indications from Europe by this arrival is one week later than that received by the Times.
