The State vs. Larceny.—The Jury found the prisoner guilty, and on his having no objection that the sentence of the Court should be passed immediately—the Court sentenced him to an imprisonment at hard labour of four months.

Mr. Clay left this city on Friday afternoon for his residence in Kentucky, with the intention, we understand, of taking the Baltimore route, in consequence of the bad state of the road by Rockville. Engagements which he had made with his friends in Frederick and Hagerstown will, however, make it impracticable to remain long enough in Baltimore to accept the public entertainment tendered to him by his fellow citizens of that city.

A recent letter from our correspondent in London, contains the following: "It may be interesting to know that the American Minister (Mr. Barlow) when presented to the King, was received with marked courtesy and kindness of manner. The reception of Mr. Gallatin, on the contrary, was repulsive in the extreme. The Duke of Wellington is probably a much more honest Minister than Mr. Canning, and the political condition of Europe renders it particularly expedient, at the present moment, for England to add to the number of her friends."

The anxieties of the country relative to the Supreme Court of the U.S. having been happily terminated, by the appointment of Mr. McLean to the vacant seat, attention is now turned to the department which that office has left. It is an eminent gratification to all good men and all who love the Union, that a man so pure and sound as Mr. McLean, should have been selected to make up the deficiency in the Supreme Court. That Court is the bulwark of our personal safety, and may become the last ensurance of Liberty and Union. Except that, perhaps no department of the government is regarded with so much concern and jealousy as the Post Office Department, and we are persuaded the citizens of this country will not soon forget the safe and equal and honorable principles which governed the late Post Master General in his appointments and the general conduct of his office, nor will they we trust, permit of sanction any departure from those principles under any administration. The business of the General Post Office, unlike the other operations of the government, has a constant and intimate relation to individuals and the private intercourse of society. To admit into such an office a purely party officer, and to establish over it a supervision designed to accommodate and sustain a party, would be abhorrent and dreadful. Society would be unhinged, confidence destroyed, and all the utility of the establishment annihilated. Yet such we are told, by authority, is the object aimed at; and that the immense patronage of the Post Office Department, is to be brought under the eye of the President—for what reform.
Some years ago a distinguished citizen of this state, and now the second officer of the government, was removed with "the rascally Postmasters." "Our suffering," says he, IS intolerable." If he does not hurry on to Washington and make some interest against his rival, Mr. Calhoun, whose friend the new Post Master is, we apprehend he will have still greater cause to rail against the rascally Postmasters.

FROM JAMAICA.—Jamaica papers have been received at Charleston, to the 25th of Jan.
Mr. Owen, of New Lanark, and New Harmony, &c. had arrived at Jamaica, on his way to Mexico, to treat with that government respecting the transfer of his "community" establishments to the Texas.
A duel took place in Jamaica, on the 8th of January, between Lieut. and Adjutant Everett, of the 23d Regiment, and another officer, whose name we have been unable to learn; and we regret to state, that the first was proved fatal to Lieut. Everett, who fell on his ground and died without uttering a word.

The British ship Kangaroo, was lost on the 18th of December, on the outer reef of the Hogtides. Nothing was saved but the lives of the crew, who were taken off after having been many days upon a small sandy Key, upon half a point of water per day a piece!
KINOTSON, (Jam.) Jan. 14.—The American schr. Messenger, Chateau, from Baltimore, 11 days out, bound to Omoa, put in here in distress, having her starboard topside stove in.

On the 17th Dec. the Espiegle discovered a vessel on the shore, which on boarding proved to be the Alabama, American merchant ship, of Portland U. S. deserted by her crew, and having a portion of her cargo still on board, consisting of linen. After a fruitless attempt to get her off, she was abandoned. The linen, rigging, &c. and her crew, (the latter having reached some huts near Cape Antonia,) were carried to the Havana by the Espiegle.

CATHOLIC ASSOCIATION IRELAND.
Mr. O'Connell said, I have a letter from that honest and upright member of Parliament Mr. Otway Cave (cheers) which I shall not read at this advanced hour of the night—I am now disposed to refer it, as I have not at present the Leicester newspaper, containing the hon. gentleman's speech. At present I shall only say, that on perusing this letter, one would imagine the writer was portraying the rotten corporation of Dublin. (cheers.) I now, Sir, give notice of a motion, for a vote of the most respectful and marked thanks of the Association to Mr. Robert Otway Cave. (Loud cheers.) It is now too late to read the address from our American friends, and therefore I shall move, before we separate, an adjournment to one o'clock on Tuesday, I wish that we should come prepared on the next day, not only to debate upon American sympathy, but to frame a vote of thanks, not like the trifling one hitherto passed to America, but strong and replete with all the talent we possess. I must say, that much praise is due to those who were instrumental in arresting American sympathy, and at the head of the best I place Mr. Coppinger. General Jackson will certainly be or is, at this moment, the President of the United States (immense cheering); and however I may have been opposed to him myself, I bow to the will of the people. (Continued applause.) He has been supported by the whole interest of the Irish emigrants, and they are sure of turning the election to any side. (Cheers.) They have in America, all that Irishmen want anywhere—a "clear stage and no favor;" and they are still distinguished for their talents, their virtues, their patriotism, their disinterested love of liberty, their perseverance, and, above all, for their ardent love for the green fields they left behind them.

Mr. O'Connell of the city of Dublin, Ireland, was opposed to the election of Gen. Jackson, but he bows to the will of the people! Very condescending. Counsellor O'Connell has very accurate information in one respect from America, namely that Gen. Jackson was supported by the whole interest of the Irish emigrants, but it is not quite so clear that they are capable of turning an election to either side. Let the American people hear and remember that.
