CITY AND STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

The hotels and restaurants of New Orleans will do more than those in any other city to conserve the national food supply.

By Tuesday night it is expected that only a camp guard will be at Camp Nicholls, where the Washington Artillery and the Second Troop Cavalry were quartered until Sunday night.

Enthusiasm and patriotism ran high Monday when the Catholic Women's Club pledged to do its bit for its country and to make the world safe for democracy.

Special train carrying more than a hundred veterans of the Civil war of both the Union and the Confederate forces, arrived in New Orleans from Los Angeles, Cal., over the Southern Pacific railroad Monday afternoon.

Another 10 per cent Louisiana negro selection will entrain for Camp Pike, Ark., about October 27.

A number of fire insurance companies, it is said, have written their representatives here to cancel policies on houses and personal property in the segregated district.

Cashmere Peytral, 47 years, keeper of a small grocery store at 201 North Anthony street, was Sunday afternoon suddenly seized with an attack of apoplexy and died while viewing the moving pictures in the Plaza Theater, Canal and Dauphine streets.

Ten alleged violators of the Sunday law were arrested in different sections of the city Sunday. In a raid on one of the saloons, the police arrested sixteen men and charged them with disturbing the peace.

The proprietor, Lawrence Lacassagne, 600 St. Roch avenue, was also arrested and charged with selling liquors on Sunday.

Through a fund provided by the mayor at the request of Mr. W. O. Hart, a happy party of fourteen Confederate veterans left for Vicksburg Sunday morning over the Yazoo and Mississippi railroad where they will remain for the entire reunion, leaving Vicksburg Friday night at the close of the festivities and reaching New Orleans Saturday morning.

The first detachment of troops to leave Camp Nicholls pursuant to recent orders, left New Orleans Sunday night about 10 o'clock. Comprising this detachment were the Second Troop of Cavalry, headquarters company of the Washington Artillery, the fifth section of each of the six batteries, each in charge of a battery officer, and the Hospital Corps. The number of troops who departed Sunday night was slightly over 200. The destination of the troops is Camp Beauregard, Alexandria, La.
