One section of our battery was detached with acouning parties of dragoons and Texan rangers. By this time a breastwork had been erected for Duncan's howitzer, and Lieutenant Rowland who had command of it, pressed the Mexicans and their Castle in good earnest. They soon descended from their nest to their outwork. Captain Vinnon threw forward one company of skirmishers to decoy the Mexicans from their fusiness, and they came too, cavalry and infantry, when our whole command rushed forward and charged the Mexicans so galantly that they had not time to stop at their Castle. Lieutenant Ayres, the foremost of all, rushed to the top of the Castle and tore down their flag. In a few minutes Uncle Sam's handkerchief was in its sead. Gen. Worth then moved the rest of our force to the Castle, and we at once opened a heavy fire upon the enemy from the Castle, with field pieces, a twelve pound brasscannon and sabort thirty-two pound howitzer, which were in the Castle. These made aix pieces of arillery our division had captured. We kept up our fire until late and remained in the Castle during the night.


