The secretary of the treasury is authorized to select such state banks as de-positories of the public money, as may be thost conve-nient to the places where the same may be collected or disbursed; but no deposit of public money is to be made at any one time, to a greater amount than three fourths of the amount of capital stock actually paid in. If there be no local bank convenient to the point where the revenue is collected, &c. then the accretary is authorized to make his deposits in some other safe bank in the state for adjacent states, upon the same terms and conditions.
