Translation from French papers. PARIS, May 21.—Passage of the Pruth.—The Austrian Observer, of the 14th of May contains the following article: "Extract of a letter dated, Jassy, May, 7th."

"Yesterday, in the evening, we received from several sources, the report that three bridges were thrown that day over the Pruth. "This morning, at half past 5, two squadrons of hussars, commanded by colonel Coprandi, entered Jassy. "The colonel went immediately to the Turkish prince Sturdza, and notified him, that his troops were occupying the principalities, and that his authority had ceased.

"An hour and a half after, the rest of the hussars made their entry in Jassy, followed by a regiment of infantry. "At about nine o'clock, general Pahlen, named governor by his Imperial Majesty, for these two principalities, took possession of the city. "The divan of boyard, has assembled at the metropolis, in order to receive directions from the new governor. His Excellency went thither at 11 o'clock, and read a proclamation written in the Moldavian language, as also a manifesto in the Russian, addressed to the Porte. The same were repeated word for word from the windows to the people who were assembled.

(Messenger de Paris.) To the above news, we shall add, the following extract of a letter from Odessa, of the 30th April: "Moldavia and Wallachia will be entirely occupied by the Russians, on the 22d of May. On the 23d the Emperor will arrive at Ismail, and on the same day, a body of the army will cross the Danube, whilst the fleet of the Black Sea, composed of ten ships of the line and six frigates, will land near Varna ten thousand men to facilitate the movement of the troops that will start from Ismail to effect a junction. At the same time, the army of Georgia will attack the garrisons of Asia, so that Poli and Anapa will become ours."

Colonel Fabvier has been named General by Capo-d'Istria, President of Greece, and it is thought the command in chief of the Grecian army will be given to a French colonel. Portugal.—(Lisbon,) May 7. A riot took place on the 30th April, in the evening, in the quarter of S. Ovidio, in the city of Porto. Several of the inhabitants were cried "Long live Don Pedro IV." The company of guard of police charged on the people; several persons were killed and others wounded. The 18th regiment of infantry and the 4th of artillery were willing to join with the people, but the officers did not permit them to leave their garrison.

The province of Alentijo is in revolt. Guerrillas have been formed in favor of Don Miguel and others in favor of Don Pedro; they fight almost every day, and destroy every thing in their way. In every city where the municipalities have been destroyed by the people, the Miguelists rob the public treasures under pretext of employing the money to celebrate brilliantly the arrival of their leaders. In many cities the garrisons have declared themselves freely for Don Pedro. At Mirandella a battalion of the 6th regiment of chasseurs has fought against the 23d regiment of the line; there were many killed and wounded. The Trombeta has announced that the Holy Tribunal of the Inquisition shall soon be re-established.

Yesterday, about forty Spaniards, among whom are several merchants established in Lisbon, much before the publication of the charter, have been arrested and put in prison: in that number are also Messrs. Goffin, formerly secretary of war; D. Simon, one of the former ecclesiastical dignities in Spain, and ex-member of the Cortes; Lassagna, ex-colonel of the Royal-Guard and political Chief of Madrid, &c. &c. It is announced that Spain has formally declared that she will not allow the refugees, companions of the marquis of Chaves to leave its territories. To that circumstance is attributed the arresting of the Spaniards whom we have just spoken of. Generally, all the individuals whose attachment to the charter of Don Pedro is known, are arrested. M. de Marceuil, the french minister, has not yet been presented to Don Miguel, it is even said he will not be presented.

Corfu, April 29. An English courier who arrived at Corfu from London, on the 22d, has remitted to the lord high commissary, despatches which are said to be of the highest importance concerning the war of Russia against the Porte. Count Guilleminot appears to have been informed of the contents of those despatches by Sir Francis Adams, for on the same day an English schooner and a French frigate have sailed steering to the south. Every mind loses itself in conjectures upon their destination, but it is thought that these two ships are destined to go in search of the French and English commanders, to communicate to them, orders concerning the actual affairs, others believe that the English government has addressed to Count Capo-d'Istria with communications of which Count Guilleminot has thought proper to instruct the French consuls. It is not doubted that the President of Greece enjoys all the confidence of the English, and it is probable that he is advised to avoid all that could at this moment perplex any more the affairs of the East.

The long agony of suspense is over, and the dreadful certainty of subjection, poverty and utter ruin, has at length been forced upon us. The hateful protecting Paris has passed, and doomed us of the South, to worse than Egyptian bondage. It is time for every man in the country—with a single spark of patriotism—who has any regard for the independence and freedom of his offspring, or who is careful of his immediate interests and future welfare, to brace himself up for sacrifice, and prepare to meet the storm. There can be no room now, except in the mind of the vertiginous, for the vanities of debate, nor can any but the more than Arabian desert, think of indulging his appetite with the productions of any state whose representatives in Congress have dived in fastening upon us this detestable badge of slavery and degradation—this accursed chain to bind us as victims to their Mammon. The southern members of Congress have done their duty to their constituents. We, of the South, also have not failed in our duty to our sister states. We have reasoned with them on the injustice of their designs. We have entreated them by every tie which men hold sacred, not to ingulf us and our children, in wretchedness and ruin. We have warned them not to create in us, towards them, that spirit which produced the revolution, by exercising towards us those acts of tyranny and oppression which kindled its flame. To our reasoning they have refused to reply; to our entreaties, they have been inattentive; and to our warning, they have responded with derision and scorn. We have, in order to divert them from their nefarious projects, exhausted every constitutional means, consistent with an association with them in regard to commercial intercourse or otherwise. We must now turn ourselves to other defenses, constitutional indeed, but at the same time with spirit pushing resistance to the very bounds of the constitution. Let there be a wall raised between them and us; and let us say unto them as Abraham said unto Lot: "Let there be no strife, I pray thee, between thee and me, and between thy herden and my herden; for we be brethren. Is not the whole world before thee? Separate thyself, I pray thee, from me: if thou wilt take the left hand, then I will go to the right; or if thou depart to the right hand, then I will go to the left."
