Baltimore, May 14. From the Plata.—The ship Galen, Cocksey, at this port yesterday morning, sailed from Montevideo on the 24th March.

The Buenos Ayres "Packet" of the latest date contains a summary of the communication addressed on the 28th February by the Government of Cordova, to that of Buenos Ayres, announcing the victory gained by the army of Gen. Paz over that of Quiroga.

The communication from the Governor of the Province of Buenos Ayres, in reply to the above, dated on the 16th March, states the efforts which the Government had made to prevent the effusion of blood, and to stop the ruin and desolation which the Republic suffered from intestine dissensions.

The French Consul General had addressed a note to the Governor of Buenos Ayres, complaining of the threats and violence which had been directed against the French residents. In consequence of this complaint the government had issued a decree, directing the police to take strict measures in order to suppress any future proceedings of a similar character.

S. sloop of war Vandalia, captain Gallagher, was at Buenos Ayres on the 19th March. THE PRO AND CON OF CONSTITUTIONAL DOCTRINES.—From the speech of Gov. Tomlinson, of Connecticut, recently delivered to the Legislature of that State, we extract the enumeration below of the conflicting views taken by various states of different provisions of the Constitution.

Substantially the same opinions have been expressed in resolutions adopted by the respective legislatures of the States of Delaware, Vermont and Ohio. Copies of these resolutions have been transmitted to me by the Governors of those States respectively, and in conformity to their requests are now communicated for your information.

A communication from the Governor of the State of Mississippi, now laid before you, announces the resolution of its Legislature, that the same "Tariff of eighteen hundred and twenty eight is contrary to the spirit of the United States, impolitic and oppressive in its operation on the Southern States, and ought to be resisted by all constitutional means."

It has been resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, that it is expedient to amend the Constitution of the United States, so as to provide a uniform mode of electing the President and Vice President throughout the several States; and to give to the people of the United States, the privilege of voting directly for the President and Vice President, without the intervention of Electors, reserving to the States respectively, their due weight in relation to the said Election.

Entertaining different views, the General Assembly of the State of Vermont has declared its opinion, that it is inexpedient "to alter the Constitution of the U. States" in the manner proposed by the State of Missouri. In compliance with the requests of the Governors of these States respectively, the documents having relation to this subject, which have been forwarded to me by them, are now communicated for your consideration.
