MAKE VALUABLE DISCOVERIES

Report Just Published of the Princeton Geological Expedition to South America.

The first report of the Princeton second geological expedition to South America has just been made known. A year ago Prof. Scott sent Messrs. Hatcher and Colburn to the unknown regions of Patagonia to extend the explorations begun by Messrs. Peterson and Hatcher of a former expedition.

The expedition, the report says, explored the country inland and to the northward for a distance of 800 miles from the Straits of Magellan, adding much to our knowledge of the geography of the country and discovering at the base of the Andes a beautiful lake 30 miles in length not previously reported and which might aptly be called Lake Princeton.

In the region of this lake, or about midway between Lake Buenos Ayres and the headwaters of the river Chilo, a new and exceedingly rich locality for vertebrate fossils was discovered and many new facts observed bearing upon the geology of the country.

The explorers were successful in making a complete section of the marine tertiary deposits of this region and in making collections of fossils from them.

In these deposits a hitherto entirely unknown formation has been discovered, which will prove of the greatest importance in finding the age of certain other beds, in regard to which there has been much discussion among geologists.

Considerable time was taken in the examination of animal life and the collection of recent birds. Extensive collections of fresh water and marine mollusks and crustaceans were secured, with a very complete series of lizards and frogs.

In addition to the considerable collection of the arts and manufactures of the different tribes inhabiting these regions, a splendid series of photographs was secured and a fairly complete dictionary of the Yuhgan language compiled.

NOW DENOUNCES HYPNOTISM.

Ferguson, Who Tried It on School Children, Writes Recantation. Prof. G. W. Ferguson, formerly of Sheboygan, Wis., who created such a furore by the practice of hypnotism upon pupils of the public schools a year ago, has denounced hypnotism. His recantation is contained in a letter directed from Englewood, Ill., received at Sheboygan. A year ago Ferguson was instructor of art in the city schools. It was discovered he was practicing the art of magic on his pupils. Children were made actors in hypnotic entertainments. The board of education was compelled to ask for his resignation. He left Sheboygan and located at Milwaukee, and then went to Chicago. In opening his condemnation of hypnotism he asks forgiveness of God for teaching and practicing it. He used to think it was a good means of leading people from sinful habits. Now he is convinced it is an abominable practice, a species of witchcraft, that only the devil and his hosts would practice. He pleads with those engaged in its practice to stop it at once.

FOOLED HIS OLD MOTHER.

Claimed He Was Studying Theology in the Joliet Penitentiary and That Gus Money. After John Buhheller wrote home to his mother in Germany that he was studying for the ministry in one of the largest institutions in the country, located at 1900 North Collins street, Joliet, and that he needed money to buy books on theology she remitted to him generously. It had always been her ambition that her boy should preach the Gospel, and she made many sacrifices to enable her to provide him with a good library.

Not long ago she asked a friend to learn the character of the institution in which John was studying theology. The friend found that 1900 North Collins street was the Illinois state penitentiary, and so wrote to Germany. Buhheller receives no more remittances for books. Buhheller was sent to the prison from Cook county for burglary in 1895. He was released on parole in 1896, but was rearrested and sent back to the institution last March.

NEW AND FATAL MALADY.

A Germ Produces Air Bubbles Under the Skin—Disease is Called Emphysema. The newest disease to be added to the troubles of mankind is called emphysema. The death from the disease at St. Vincent's hospital at New York of John McGuire was the sixth death from it so far recorded, and three of these were in St. Vincent's.

The disease is produced from a germ known as the aerogenes bacillus, which becomes active underneath the skin and produces air. The skin is expanded in such a way that the victim takes shape out of all resemblance to that of a human being. McGuire fell down stairs and was severely injured. Why he should have been attacked with emphysema the physicians are unable to tell. Dr. De-mouilly, who had the care of the case, said that no cure for the disease had yet been discovered.

Looks Like a Magical Watch.

A curious watch has been brought out in France. The dial is transparent, but there are no works to be seen, and the hands appear to move by magic. The secret lies in concealing the works at the edge of the case and communicating the motion to the hands by means of a glass disk.

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STABS PRIMA DONNA.

Dramatic Bit of Realism Not on Programme at St. Louis Theatre.

Just before the curtain fell the other night upon the opera "Pagliaccio" at the Century theatre, St. Louis, an accident occurred which may prove serious to the prima donna. It was a bit of realism entirely unexpected by the participants, and proved a great shock to the audience.

At the close of the opera the tenor, Francisco Collez, is supposed to stab his wife to death. When Collez reached the final he appeared to be carried away by the frenzy of the situation, and when he drew his long knife and plunged it toward his stage wife, Miss Nedda Morrison, the audience was horrified to observe that the keen blade had been thrust into her left arm just above the elbow. The curtain went down immediately. Miss Morrison fainted and a physician was called and dressed the wound.

Confusion prevailed in the house and it was thought for awhile that she had been killed. The doctor took three long minutes in Miss Morrison's arm, and she was removed to her hotel. To-day she was resting easy, but it is feared she will not have the use of the injured member for several weeks. The wound is deep and very painful.

DEALS WITH CAMPAIGN.

Miss Clara Barton, President of the Red Cross Society, is Writing a Book.

Clara Barton, president of the Red Cross, is writing a book giving a full history of that society and its work in the recent war, answering charges made against it and its officers. The volume will be sold by subscription by the American Red Cross association. Speaking of Santiago, Miss Barton says:

"The schooner Morse, following the belief of an angelic thought of some lovely home committee of ladies, had come in laden with 1,000 tons of ice. The tug Triton, which towed her all the way from the Kennebec, and which was to be held for our use, was at once seized by the government. Santiago had neither an icehouse nor a pile of dry sawdust, and the ice remained on the Morse till discharged, order by order, among the transports of the sick, wounded and convalescing as they sailed one after another with their freight of human woe.

"The Morse never came to us. Neither for love nor money could transportation be gotten. I did, however, near the last, obtain the use of a leaky lighter for two hours to get off some mules. But I might specify that it was on neither of the above considerations."

LEAVES HER BACHELOR CLUB

A Member of the Noted Michigan Organization Becomes a Bride.

The famous Bachelor Girls' club of Edwardsburg, Mich., lost a member when Miss Charlotte Schaafelt married Dwight Loveland, of Syracuse, N. Y. The young woman is the first member of the unique club since its organization to enter the matrimonial state, and her companions made the wedding an auspicious affair.

The Bachelor Girls' club is an association formed to prevent early marriages. No member is allowed to marry until she is 25 years old. It is the only club of its kind in the United States, and its promoters are engaged in establishing branch societies in the country.
