CITY AND STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Ernest Watson Burke, 923 Spain street, who died yesterday at his home of paralysis of the stomach, was one of the oldest citizens of the Third District and was well known among the insurance men of the city.

He was born in New Orleans April 4, 1851, and in 1883 was married to Miss Rose Anna Fox of this city.

Fire early Sunday destroyed the bottling plant of the Standard Brewing Company, 514-32 South Johnson street and damaged eight smaller buildings in its vicinity, causing a loss estimated at \$75,000.

A general alarm was sounded and repeated. Firemen from all sections of the city fought the flames more than four hours before they were under control.

Cancellation won the day Sunday in the port labor situation, and the longshoremen, who went on strike Wednesday, voted to return to work at once on the increased scale, pending adjustment of remaining differences.

The most hopeful feature of Sunday's developments is that the longshoremen virtually decided to accept a contract for three years, as offered by the ship agents and stevedores, instead of standing out for a five-year contract.

The ceremonies began at 5 o'clock. Miss Estelle Marguerite Sahren raised the flag while regulars fired three volleys. Miss Mayme Rainey, attired in a waist of stars and a skirt of stripes, sang "The Star-Spangled Banner." Addresses were delivered by Achille Blais, E. C. Killian, Assistant District Attorney Walter B. Hamlin and Loys Charbonnet.
