FURTHER NEWS FROM MEXICO.

As we have no later dates from Mexico than the 20th ult, it is impossible to conjecture the consequences of the affair mentioned in yesterday's paper; notwithstanding the assurances of the organs of government, there is little reason to hope that tranquility will be permanently esthe administration shall remain in the hands of the actual Vice President.
