WE beg leave to call the attention of our readers to the sale of some valuable property to be sold this day at the Arcade by Isaac L. McCoy, auctioneer. Among them we perceive there is a valuable apple plantation in English Taro, and the "lake hotel," at the Mouth of Bayou St John. The latter has been closed to the public for a long period of time for the want of some enterprising and competent person to take charge of it. There place of public resort in the vicinity of the city is desirable, or so well adapted to contribute to comfort, and the amusement of the inhabitants of the city, as the situation is so desirable and salubrious. The building itself and the beautiful establishment in its neighborhood are so well adapted to the convenience of the public, and conveniences which private parties could desire, so which the season is now fast approaching when every one will be desirous of breathing the country air, and if the establishment was undertaken by a person able and competent to manage it in a manner worthy of its situation, it would become the general rendezvous of our citizens in the summer, and in a short period prove one of the most attractive establishments in the country, particularly if the Orleans navigation company are now extending their fine tranship route from the bayou bridge to the basin near Rampart street, which will always afford a safe and pleasant ride to the lake at all seasons of the year, contribute greatly to enhance the value of the establishment in question.

GAS WORKS.—Today's paper is almost exclusively devoted to the act chartering the Gas light banking company. The objects of this company deserve public notice; but they may simultaneously demand public investigation. For this we have not now room; you may be permitted to state that the bonus which this company was expected to give, was to light the city with gas—either without expense; or at moderate or reduced rates.

"True that by strategic skill in the advocates of the act, a special clause to that effect was not inserted; we believe it was understood. As it is, the company promises to have no claims on the corporation; and the corporation none on the company: so that the banking company is valid, whether the company does or does not light the city with gas. This may appear a singular inference; yet the act of charter unfortunately warrants it: for there is no obligation or responsibility on the company. This may be more fully developed hereafter.

HARRY'S benefit for his play of Tuonoos, will take place this evening. We have before written favorably of the drama; and sincerely hope that his numerous friends will not fail to do him the justice which their kindness and gentility may prompt.

WE have heretofore cautioned the public concerning extended loans being made by the U. S. bank, to cause the nation in its trials. Those loans within a few months past exceed 12 millions; but when the day of distress comes, on the expiration of the charter, the reaction will produce the most disastrous consequences.

The banking capital of Louisiana is now sufficiently mentioned to supply the pecuniary demands of her citizens who should from dearbought experience endeavor to rely on her own resources in this respect. It is always preferable to prevent than remedy.

In a letter published in an afternoon paper of yesterday, Mr John H Payne insinuates that the opinions expressed in his writings in this journal were instigated by Messrs Russell and Rowe. This is not the fact. The writer of this is alone responsible for them. But might as well attribute the personal articles against him in the same afternoon paper, with equal or greater injury to Mr Payne; and if that gentleman does not desire should impartially investigate his claims on the generosity of an American public, the less said the better.

INDIAN COFFEE.—This grows wild in various parts of this state; and is the veritable plant lauded in the history of Florida as being there indigenous, and not equal to that of Cuba.

NEW HARBINGER.—The administration gain in the state since 1835, is near FOUR THOUSAND. A convincing proof of the wise and independent course pursued by the Executive in daily becoming more popular as its measures are brought into action.

WE have received a late file of the Malta Gazette, containing nothing new. From a statement in the Monitor Egyptian, the determination to organize a powerful Egyptian navy seems unabated. The officers already on the establishment consist of an admiral, 25 captains, 117 lieutenants, with a staff and officers of inferior grade in proportion to the number of the service. Mahomed Ali has placed his son Said Bey, of 11 years of age, as midshipman of the second class, on board the ship of the line *Saint Jean d'Acre*. The young prince is accompanied by twenty-four youthful companions, and numerous masters of languages of navigation. Until this time to practice, it is considered that in six years he may be capable taking the command of a ship of war.

AT TRICOU, DOMINGUE & CANOES.
