Peculiar Design of a Dancing Mas-

ter's Monument. One of the best-known dancing masters in eastern Connecticut a few years ago was Gurdon Cady. He was one of the best fiddlers and prompters in the state. No festive occasion where dancing was a feature could be carried out in fashion without Mr. Cady to superintend the figures. He lived in Central village, in Plainfield, all his life, and accumulated considerable property, says the New York Times.

Before Gurdon Cady died he had a monument built under his own immediate instructions. This stands over his hurial place in the pretty village cemetery in Central. He gave the sculptor the directions for marking the stone, and sat and played his favorite airs in the graveyard while the men were at work. Day after day, as the lettering and figures were being chiseled into the granite, Cady would appear, and, after chatting with the men, take out his violin, tune up, and then play "Arkansas Traveler," "Money Musk," "McCloud's Reel," or "The Devil's Dream," as his fancy prompted.

The stone, when completed, was of unique design. On one side is pictured a cow, above and beneath which are the words: "My First Jersey Cow. Record-2 Lbs. and 34 of Butter from 13 Quarts of Milk." On the reverse side of the stone Mr. Cady's favorite violin is delineated on the granite. Over the picture are the words: "All ready, Mr. Cady!" The violin is then represented, with the words: "At Rest" beneath.

The other sides of the stone pillar bear the family obituaries, in the usual form.

A COIN WORTH \$6,000. Winnipeg Men Own a Piece of Money Made 140 B. C.

Charles Lunn and J. J. Schragge, of Winnipeg, are the possessors of a rare Numismatists say that it is worth from \$5,000 to \$6,000. The coin is a Jewish silver shekel, worth intrinsically about 52 cents, and about ing changed to the Chien-Taing throne as large as an American or Canadian half dollar. It appears to be very ancient. On the one side is a representation of Aaron's rod, with the words, "Jerusalem the Holy" in Hebrew characters and on the other a pot of manna and the inscription in the same characters. "Shekel Israel."

Above the pot of manna there is supposed to be a sort of effulgence or scroll. bearing in the middle a Hebrew character. Upon the presence of this mark, which experts can detect by heating the coin, depends its genuineness. Experts state that the coin is the shekel and ruler of the Jews, 140 B. C. He was famous in Jewish history. The coin was obtained by its present holders from a person in whose possession it had been for over 20 years. The present holders have each a half interest in it. The coin is in a safety deposit vault, whence it can only be taken by the two jointly. The Numismatic bank of Boston places the value of the piece at from \$5,000 to \$6,000. The owners are now waiting for replies from Great Britain.

"GREEN GILLS" UNSALABLE Seaweed Cripples an Important Vir-

Emperor of China Issues a Proclamation for a Fast Day.

Is Filled with Superstitions Dread by the Coming Solar Event and Seeks to Avert Wrath of Heaven.

ceived, through United States Minister Denby, a copy of the recent decree issued by the emperor of China to ward off the wrath of Providence, as indicated in the eclipse predicted for the Chinese New Year's day. The document is only hope of saving her life lay in repronounced by experts to be a masterful exhibition of typical Chinese statesmanship, in view of the existing critical condition of affairs in the Celestial empire. The decree reads as follows:

"According to the Chun-Chiu (spring and autumn annals), it has been stated that an eclipse of the sun on the first day of the year betokens an impending calamity, hence the sovereigns of every dynasty which has preceded us have always made it a point, whenever an eclipse of the sun is prognosticated, to undergo self-abasement and humble themselves before heaven in order to avert the wrath from above. In the case of our own imperial dynasty, for instance, during the reigns of their majesties Kang-Hsi and Chien-Lung (1662-1794) there were observed two eclipses of the sun which fell on a New Year's day; and now, according to the board of astronomy, on the first day of the twenty-fourth year of our reign (January 22, 1898), there will yet be another eclipse of the sun.

"We are filled with forebodings at this news, and hasten to seek within ourselves for sins which may have thus brought the wrath of high heaven upon the land. We further command that the ceremonies of congratulation, usually held on New Year's day in the Taiho throne hall, be curtailed and only ordinary obeisances be made, the place behall, instead of the Taiho throne hall. The banquet usually given to the imperial clansmen on New Year's day must also be stopped, and when the eclipse occurs let all members of the count wear sober garments and assemble in the inner palace before the altar set up to heaven to pray for forbearance and mercy to the country at large.

WATER IN WELLS BECOMES HOT. Queer Phenomenon Noted in Some

Parts of Arizona. The wells along a defined line to the south and west of Phoenix, Ariz., have within a week become producers of hot water and apprehension is felt by many of the residents in the region affected that they are about to become participants in a grand volcanic drama. In some of the wells the temperature of the well water rose 20 degrees in a single night. In a few the phenomenon disappeared soon after its appearance. In a majority of the cases, however, the wells ra, and from that port brought to New fairly steam from their newly-acquired

heat. The first known of this curious state of affairs was a report nearly two weeks ago that the wells at Maricona, on the Southern Pacific railroad, 30 miles south of Phoenix, had suddenly become hot. It was four days thereafter that the phenomenon first was noticed a dozen miles west of Phoenix. A test at one well showed a temperature of nearly 100 degrees. No difference is noted in the wells in the immediate vicinity of

Phoenix. The line of the subterranean heat wave follows the general direction of the Sierra Estrella mountains, a volcanic chain lying immediately south of the Gila river. Thence it appears to continue on in the direction of the Harqua Hala mountains, near which are a number of large and modern volcanic cones and hills of drifted volcanic ash. petition to the legislature asking to be Further to the east the lava flows are so geologically modern as to have overwhelmed in a number of places the cliff dwellings of the ancients.

Though no earthquake shocks have been noted in southern Arizona for years, it is the general belief that hot springs have broken out at each of the points affected, for the line of the phenomenon passes two rivers. This view is supported by the fact that at Agua Caliente, 100 miles southwest, and on Castle creek, 60 miles north, are immense springs of mineralized water with temperature of 130 degrees.

A CONNECTICUT TOMBSTONE FEARS ECLIPSE OF SUN. LIVES WITHOUT A STOMACH. German Woman Undergoes a Curious

Operation Successfully. A surgical operation, by which the entire stomach of a woman, aged 56, was removed successfully more than three months ago without any material injury to the health or activity of the patient is fully described in the Medical Record of New York.

! The case is described by Dr. Carl The state department has just re- Schlatter, of the University of Zurich, who performed the operation. Anna Landis, a silk weaver of Zurich, was compelled to go to the hospital last Angust, having a huge tumor in the stomach. The doctors concluded that the moving the entire stomach. Accordingly the surgeon clipped off the oseophagus close to where it entered the stomach, and then cut off the intestine two or three inches below the stomach. The walls of the stomach were also freed from such connections as existed with surrounding parts of the body, and then the entire organ was removed. Having the stomach out of the way,

it became necessary to unite the intestine with the end of the oesophagus. On attempting to unite the two ends it was found that they could with difficulty be made to touch. In fact the strain of bringing them to a juncture was so great that to unite them permanently was manifestly out of the question. In this predicament Surgeon Schlatter found that what he calls the knuckle of the intestine below the severed end could easily be brought to join the end of the oesophagus. Accordingly he closed up the end of the intestine absolutely, as one might close the end of a severed artery. Then he took the bend of the intestine in his hand, cut a slit in it that would just fit the severed end of the oesophagus, and sewed the end and slit together. This done there was then a direct channel from the patient's throat down through the intestines, while in place of a stomach was the end of the intestine—a length of about 15 inches that lay on one side. The entire operation required two and a half hours. The patient left the hospital October 11 with restored health and good appetite.

STRUCK BY A WATERSPOUT. Capt. Corren's Disastrous Cruise to Western Shore of Africa.

Capt. John Correa, who for the past 25 years has made New Bedford, Mass., his sailing port, arrived at New York the other day on the Red line steamer Caracas from La Guavra.

His last trading voyage was a disastrous one. A little more than a year ago Capt. Correa sailed out of New Bedford harbor in command of a 700-ton schooner for the west coast of Africa, where he proposed driving some sharp bargains with the natives.

"And I did it," said the skipper, as he stepped from the gang-plank. "I traded them all sorts of gimcracks for elephants' tusks, tiger and lion skins and whole lot of other things that people in this country are willing to pay big money for. But a waterspout sent my craft to the bottom, and here I am bound at my age to start life anew."

His vessel was struck by the waterspout just east of the Bermudas. He succeeded in getting away in boats with his crew before the ship sank, and they were picked up by an English tramp steamer. They were taken to Laguay-

NEW REVENUE CUTTERS SPEEDY Launching of the Onondaga at Cleveland, O., a Success.

"Our new cutter Onondaga, launched at Cleveland the other day," said Chief Engineer Collans, "made a successful plunge into the water, although a blinding snowstorm was raging. As soon as the craft slid off the ways it came to the proper draft without the slightest difficulty. Machinery for the Onondaga, as well as the sister vessel Algonquin, is ready for assembling into both, and this work will be commenced at once. It is desired to have these vessels ready for cruising not later than June 1, and all the indications are that this programme will be carried out. Each of the new cutters is 205 feet in length over all, 32 feet beam, with a tonnage of 820 and 2,600 horse-power. Their armament comprises four rapidfire guns each, with places for four more if needed, and two torpedo tubes can be carried. These vessels can go better than 20 miles an hour, which will make them speedier than the cutter Gresham."

ATTACKED BY LYNXES.

Cedar Inspector's Battle for Life in a

Michigan Swamp. A cedar inspector in one of Robert Rae's camps at Hillman, Mich., started for camp at a late hour. In a lonely swamp, about one mile from camp, he was attacked by seven lynxes.
