NUEVA ORLEANS, 19 DE NOVIEMBRE.

Según lo que hemos oido por personas dignas de crédito, correspondencia con Méjico, según el siguiente, parece que el Sr. Zavala ha sido destituido del ministerio de hacienda.

Además de la república que salió de Méjico, y desembocó en la costa de Méjico, más tarde, del equinoccio 22,000 hombres mas de guerra, y según las noticias de España, por el correo que llegó el 1º del presente corriente díes de navegación, el 15 de agosto, salió de Cádiz la fragata "Perla" convoyando 4,500 hombres; el 1º de octubre, saldrá de Iberia con 2,000 hombres.

Se dice que también viene el Sr. Saint Llorente, y otros cuatro gatos a dirigir las operaciones sobre Méjico.

Vera Cruz 6 de Noviembre.

El que se rompe un braso no se pone a discutir como no se lo habrá roto, ó como hará para que se verifique ad imposible de que lo que pagó no haya pasado; sus conatos y diligencias se contraen, & que le apliquen los recursos que tiene el arte para los casos semejantes al en que él se encuentra.

Trabajemos todos en consolidar el orden público, y los manantiales de las riquezas aparecerán tan abundantes como se deseá: el agricultor, el comerciante y el fabricante, no se cansan en ninguna empreza cuando están amagados de las convulsiones del país en que residen; temen perder no solo su trabajo, sino también sus capitales: estos quedan improductivos, y una multitud de brasos se quedan en la inacción: conjúrennos, pues, contra los alarmistas, y contra los que quieren, bajo cualesquier pretextos, subvertir el orden: ellos son los verdaderos enemigos del restablecimiento de nuestro crédito, y ellos los verdaderos enemigos de la libertad y de la humanidad, puesto que parece se complotan en que los hombres se despidan.

many yards; other trees have been broken off in the midge, or had their branches swipped off close to the trunk, by a hurricane. This terrible scourge, after devastating the wood for the space of a quarter of a league, rooting up more than 500 trees, among which was a walnut tree of such dimensions, that six men taking each other by the hand could scarcely span round it, but which was blown to the opposite side of the road, fell upon the village of Guay, two leagues from Toul, where it carried away the roofs of fifteen houses. This took place on the afternoon of the 13th instant, at 2 o'clock, whilst the inhabitants were at vespers. It was fortunate for them that they were at church, for otherwise some of them would certainly have lost their lives."

Portuguese funds have fallen from 45% to 44%, in consequence of the detention of an American vessel by the Portuguese fleet.

An English vessel had also been captured by the Austrians on account of having on board 10 tons of iron, which was considered as contraband of war. She had been sent into Algesiras. The captain offered to deliver up the iron, but as the vessel was in quarantine the Spanish authorities were opposed to it.

The King of Spain had an attack of apoplexy, or something resembling it, whilst at church prayers on the evening of Sept. 12th. He remained in a state of stupor about 20 minutes. On the 14th he had in a good measure recovered.

PARIS Sept. 29.—We mentioned yesterday a rumor of the renewal of hostilities between the Russians and the Turks. This report seems to be confirmed by the following extract of a commercial letter of the 18th inst. from Vienna.—"At the opening of the Exchange to-day Bank actions were at 11. 90, but they suddenly fell to 11. 90. This fall is attributed to intelligence of the rupture of negotiations, serious communications at Constantinople, and the definitive march of the Russian forces on the Turkish capital."—Galignani's Messenger.

PARIS, Sept. 28.—It was rumoured on Saturday that hostilities were renewed between the Russians and the Turks on the 8th of September, and the imperial forces expected to arrive under the walls of Constantinople on the 18th. It is said that the negotiations were broken off in consequence of some of the advanced posts of the Russians having been massacred, and that troops were landed from several English vessels for the purpose of restoring tranquility, but their presence only exasperated the rage of the Muscovites still more, and a dreadful catastrophe was expected to be the result.

TERIBLE STORM IN SWITZERLAND.

The following deplorable details are given by the Lausanne Gazette.—On the 4th instant the wind began to blow briskly from the south-west, in the district of Luggane, at five o'clock in the morning, and gradually augmented till one in the afternoon, when it had become extremely violent. It was not so much of a wind as a union of a thousand whistlers, which beating flat upon the surface, up the waves to an extraordinary height, and then drove them with fury over the houses. Some soft winter spouts, as white as snow, advanced over the lake, and spread terror among the inhabitants who had flocked on the banks. They passed to the village and there did immense damage. The roofs of the houses were torn off, and the tiles and laths carried to a great distance; the chimneys were knocked down the doors wrested from their hinges, and many persons thrown to the ground. Such was the dread inspired that it was expected all the houses would have been laid in ruins. The damage was equally great in the vineyards. Elms, fig-trees, and trees laden with fruit, were torn up by the roots, or broken off in the midst. At about four o'clock the clouds which moved northward with great rapidity, discharged torrents of rain, and shortly after the hurricane ceased. After the shower, accompanied with hail and thunder had lasted half an hour, the sun shone, and ere long the sky became serene. It appears happily no one perished. The whole tract of country suffered more or less damage. Beyond Mont Serene, the devastation was even greater. The immense plains of Magadino, from that village to Bellinzona, is completely laid under water. The Tessin has broked all its banks, and carried with it the inhabitants of the country with their flocks, furniture, etc., entered in a most threatening manner into Bellinzona, which was already half transformed into a lake by other torrentes. Signals of distress were heard in all directions, but it was not in the power of any man to afford succor to his neighbor. In the night of the 4th, the Rhine overflowed near Rheineck, in the Canton of St. Gall, and the whole of the surrounding country was inundated. A letter from Berlin expresses an opinion that Gen. Diebitsch, i/ listening to the proposition of the Porte for peace, is only endeavoring to gain time, as with a force not exceeding 70,000 men he cannot present himself before the walls of Constantinople. Under the appearance of moderation, says this letter, he is temporizing till Choumali shall be carried, and the Russian troops in observation shall have joined his standard. After leaving a corps of observation in the valley of the Heber, he will then march with 12,000 men against Constantinople, the capture of which will take place in the finest season, which in that country is the month of October.

CONSTANTINOPLE Aug. 30.—The Russian army, which keeps along the sea coast and marches upon the capital is preceded by parties Cossacks, who frequently go forward to great distances. On the 27th they ventured to within a few miles of Constantinople, and created great alarm in that capital. The Asiatic troops, who seek nothing but plunder, immediately commenced excesses in different quarters, and undoubtedly intended to take vengeance on the Franks, whose Bazaars they covet; but the Sultan happily succeeded in restraining them. A great part of these miscreants were sent to the next day for the army, and the Grand Seignior himself marched at their head with other troops, leaving his capital to the protection of the Prophet and the English who had just lanced some foreigners for the protection of Pera and the foreigners who are there."
