

Produced at Artspace a year ago, the show has been seen in Kingston, Boston, London (Western University), and Toronto. Bateman will be presenting a revised version of the work at the Union in preparation for two shows at the Robert Gill Theatre (University of Toronto) as well as a series of performances in Ottawa in June and Vancouver in Early July.

As well as Bateman's performance, Toronto-based performance artist David Roche will be presenting selections from his work. One of Roche's most acclaimed pieces, *David Roche Talks To You About Love*, has been seen at a number of film festivals and began as a staged performance piece.

Bateman and Roche shared the stage for the first time at Queerculture, and have also appeared as part of a stand-up comedy festival entitled "Fags, Dykes, and a Mike" during the spring of 1992.


