CITY COUNCIL

Sitting of April 19, 1828.

The members present were Messrs. Gordon, White, Frison, Laverty, ...

Mr. Rodriguez moved that the order be laid upon the table, as it should have been introduced not by an alderman but by the sheriff of the district court.

Mr. Rodriguez moved also, that they should immediately proceed to the postponed examination of the title of Mr. B. Fleytas, so that the sitting might be brought to a close.

On motion of Mr. Lemonier, Mr. Fleytas communicated to the council such papers as proved the legality of his election, Mr. Fleytas was unanimously acknowledged a member of the council.

Mr. Gordon was desirous that the writ of Judge Lewis should not be directed to the city council, but to the Mayor.

Mr. Canonge moved that all discussion on this subject should be avoided until the Mayor shall have officially announced to the council that he has received the order in question.

(From the N. Y. American.) The state of affairs in Washington, both in and out of the House of Representatives, is calculated to excite the indignation of every thinking man in the nation.

Specimen of English comfort.—An English provincial paper, (the Lincoln Mercury) gives the annexed description of a funeral in that country, and of the well-lighted and comfortably warmed apartment, into which the perishing relic of mortality was laid for its last abode.

"On Monday last, at six o'clock the funeral of ... was deposited on a canopy bedstead in the mausoleum, decorated with escutcheons. From the roof of the building was suspended a beautiful ground glass chandelier, having the armorial bearings emblazoned on the sides; and the vault, (which is of sufficient capacity for a large number of coffins) was warmed with a stove, the fire of which, and the lights of the chandelier, we understand, are still kept up."

(From the New Bedford Courier.) The ship Maria, whose arrival we announce this day, from the Pacific Ocean, is probably, the oldest vessel now employed in the whaling business. She was built at Pembroke in this state, during the Revolutionary war, and was intended for a privateer, but was purchased by the venerable William Roach, of this town, for a more Pacific purpose, by whom she was transferred to Mr. Sampel Rodman, the present owner. Her register is dated in 1782. She has performed four voyages to London,

three to the coast of Brazil, one to the Indian Ocean, one to the Falkland Islands, and fifteen to the Pacific.

(From the New-Branswick Freeman.) Abduction.—About two weeks since there came to this city a woman—or an animal in human's apparel, calling her name Mary Nelson—apparently about 50 years of age, of most uninviting exterior, and a countenance shockingly disfigured by disease; having with her a female child, between two and three years old. Suspicions were at once excited, that the child was not in the possession of its mother.

It appeared, we understand, in the course of her trial, that she had been in the Hospital at Philadelphia.

Domestic Habits of the Turks.—With the Turks we had but little intercourse; but when we were admitted to their houses, which was merely upon two occasions, our reception varied in no degree from that to which we had been accustomed throughout the Levant, saving once, when the pipe with which we were presented was the cool harghile, (in which the smoke passes through a vase of water), instead of the amber-mouthed chibouque; and on all occasions the silver containing coffee and sweetmeats was handed round by an Arab or a Nubian slave, in lieu of the female, by whom we had been waited on when visiting a house in the Archipelago.
