MAINDER OF THE POLISH ARMY-ES-TABLISHMENT OF A RUSSIAN PROVIN-CIAL GOVERNMENT IN POLAND-ABO-LITION OF THE HEREDITARY PEERAGE IN FRANCE.

Yesterday's mail; due on last Monday, brought New-York papers of the 21st, and Washington of the 22d of November.
