Professor Stleman's Legitures.—The lecture last evening. April 8, was upon Electre-Magnetism and Galvanism. He stated that Galvanism is not altogether an independent power, but is, in some degree, associated with light, heat, attraction, and repulsion. The effects produced by this power revery extraordinary. This science has arisen within the lest hulf century, and although some isolated facts are recorded, showing that some of the effects of Galvanism were known long before, yet the honor of the discovery of this powerful agent belongs to the Professor Galvani, who first brought it into notice in 1790.—There are instances of animals possessing the power of producing the effects of an electric discharge, and communicating the shocks by a power which amounts to a galvanic battery. This power is controlled by the will of an animal. The Sorinam cel is the most remarkable animal of this description. Some of them are described as eighteen feet in length, give a very severe shock—and are capable of charging a battery. Galvani made the discovery by accident. He had some frogs, skinned and dressed, ready to be cooked for his wife, who was an investment of the scientific world; and for eight or ten years it was supposed to be an attribute of animal life. This however was proved to be a mistake by a paul of Galvani, who tried an experiment with piles of silver und copper, consisting of about one hendred numbers—and taus produced a small shock. Zinc has since been substituted for silver, and various other improvements made, one of the most important of which was by Professor Hare of Phila elphia, who hit upon the beautiful experiment of immersing all the piles in deluced acid at the same time, which adds to the power, and produces a great flow of heat—although but little projective power is manifested.
