The origin of the unfortunate encounter between our citizens and the Indians we understand is as follows: Some of the citizens of this country removed the spring to the Grand Chariton, 70 or 80 miles from this place, for the purpose of raising stock, and settled in the northern end of Chariton or Randolph county.

Indian Hostilities on our Frontier.

On Sunday morning last, our citizens were thrown into considerable consternation and excitement on the arrival of news that a number of respectable citizens of this county had been killed and wounded by a band of the Ioway, Sioux, or Winnenaga Indians, located on the head waters of the Chariton, in the adjoining county of Randolph, a few days previous.

One hundred also started on the same day from the county of Chariton, and one hundred and fifty were ready in Randolph.

It was supposed they would rendezvous in Randolph in the same night, and proceed en masse as soon as their arrangements should be completed.

On Tuesday numbers continued to pass through Fayette on their way to join their brethren. On Wednesday morning a company of upwards of fifty passed through this place from Colombia, Boone county, under the command of the Rev. Mr. Suggett, who has heretofore been engaged in the Indian wars of the country.

William Taylor, Esq. who had been despatches express to the Governor, returned on Tuesday night, with an order from the Governor for calling out one thousand men. On the information reaching the Governor, an express was immediately sent to St. Louis for the purpose of notifying the commanding officers of the U. S. stationed there, that a detachment might be sent up without delay.

We understand those who started from here on Monday were under the Col. Honer.

The whole expedition is mounted, each person taking with him, exclusive of his arms, simply a blanket and a small quantity of provisions.

From present appearances, it seems probable that 1500 or 2000 men will have arrived at the theatre of operations within a week.

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demanding such things as they wanted, and when the men were from home, conducted themselves abusively towards the females, drawing their tomahawks upon them, and driving off their stock. It is also stated that they whipped a Mr. Myrtle, lately from the neighbourhood. Mr. M. then proceeded to the settlements and procured the assistance of some of his friends, who proceeded with him to try and arrange matters with the Indians or drive them off.

Some weeks ago, rumours of an expected insurrection reach this place from the counties of Gloucester and Matthews. As is the case with all rumours, but especially those which menace danger, the rumour in question flew through the country in all directions, exaggerated by every individual who circulated it, until at last it assumed an importance most ridiculously in contrast with the truth.

As to evidence to justify apprehension, we can, after much enquiry, not learn a single fact, or even a suspicious circumstance; except that on Saturday evening, information was laid before the Executive by an individual in this place against two negro men, whom he overheard on that day, exhorting each other, to punctually and firmness, in executing the purpose of their rising on that night.
