Be it an soled by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembl a, That every person, who, either by virtue of a French or Spanish grant recognised by the laws of the United States, or under a claim confirmed by the commissioners appointed for the purpose of ascertaining the rights of persons claiming lands in the State of Louisiana, or by virtue of any title derived from the United States, owns a tract of land bordering on any river, creek bayou, or water course, in the said territory, and not exceeding in depth forty arpents, French measure, shall be entitled to a preference in becoming the purchaser of any vacan tract of land adjacent to, and back of, within three years, after the date of this act, de- of December. liver to the register of the proper land office, a notice, in writing, stating the situation and extent of the tract of land he wishes to purchase, and shall also make the payment and payments for the same at the time and times which are or may be prescribed by law for the disposal of the other public lands in the said State, the time of his delivering the notice aforesaid being considered as the date of the purchase. And if any such person shall fail to deliver such notice within the said period of three years, or to make such payment or payments at the time abovementioned, his right of proemption shall cease, and become void; and the land may thereafter be purchased by any other person in the same manner, and on the same terms as are, or may be, provided by law for the sale of other public lands in the said State.
