In 1831, Tylee sold back his interest to Noah, who entered upon the same as joint proprietor; and, in 1932, Mr. Noah sold out his moiety to Mr. Webb, but did not renew the stipulations of the bond, and finally, Webb to meet some embar-rassments, assigns all his interest to trustees. Mr. Noah prayed that his bond may be cancelled, with a view of ea-tablishing a paper himself, and on the ground that, having himself, and on the ground that, having purchased back the interest of Mr. Tylee, the bond became null and void.
