If this milder process had not been adopted, many offences, inferior to murder and other calital crimes, would have gone unpunished. The case in the early history of Kentucky is analogous.—Until the introduction of the penitentiary system into that State, about the year 1800, horse-stealing was punished with the loss of life. The cases embraced by the law of Indiana, to which these remarks refer, were grand and petty larcenty, burglary, burning property secretly—such as out-houser, stacks of grain, etc., abduction of women having property in their own right, to affect a marriage against their own consent.

ARRIVAL OF THE BRITISH QUEEN.

The arrangements for a line of steam packets to the West Indies are at length completed. The packets are to be si 1250 tons burthen, and are to be ready for sea by the autumn of 1841.

Among the passengers of the British Queen is the Earl of Mulgrave, eldest son of Lord Normanby. He is on his way to Canada.

Prince Castelcicala, ambassador extraordinary from the King of the Two Sicilies, arrived in London on the 26th April. He is on a special mission relating to the sulphur difficulties.

Some of the most eminent lawyers in Hanover have given their opinions that the marriage of the Duke of Sussex with Lady Augusta Murray was vaiid, according to the laws of Hanover, and that his son by that marriage is therefore entitled to succeed to the throne, in case of the death of the present King without issue capable of inheriting. The Fugiish, on the other hand, confine their operations to intrigue. They are inclined to prevent by their navel force, the departure of the Ottoman fleet, from Alexandria, while Turkish ships, with men and warities stores, should unresistedly effect a descent in Syria. These intrigues have been supported by Colonel Hodges, the British consul, who intervening on the part of the Turkish silors, demanded a conference with the pacha, and begged the latter to allow those sailors desirous of returning home to proceed to Consaintinople. The pecha made the following reply:

It is your policy which has occasioned the present state of affairs—you have obliged me to make preparations of defence, and to fear a blockade and landing of troops. I am on the footing of war—military law is in vigor—and therefore, should any officer or sail attempt to go away, I will have him publicly shot as a deserter.

They attacked his house on Friday evening, and shot him while endeavoring to excape.—
There were in the house at the time of the attack several other persons, two of whom were severely wounded. After they had killed and driven from their houses the family they pilisgred the house, and set on fire the dwelling together with several outhouses.

The saher families that were attacked, lived in the neighborhood, several of whom were killed, but we have not been able to learn their names.

The Indians which committed three depredations are said to number about fifty or sixty, and conseit themsolves in the hammocks between the Apalachicola river and Tallahassee until a favorable opportunity offers for them to committ such like deeds.

This forms the fourth family which has been murdered in that vicinity since the \$23 \text{ Ultimo, and it is time some steps were taken to prevent them in future.
