PRUSSIA. PARIS, May 20. The Prussian army is divided into eight corps exclusive of the Royal Guard. Each corps consists of about 10,000 men on the peace establishment, and about 21,000 men on the war establishment.

The 1st, 2d, 5th and 6th corps are on the frontiers of Poland, under the command of Field-Marshal Giscuena. The third corps is stationed between Halle and Magdeburg. There remain, therefore, only the 4th, 7th, and 8th, to act upon the Rhine; but as they have not called out all the Landwehr, the troops placed on the left bank of the Rhine cannot make an effective force of more than 50,000 men.

Tobacco (Leaf), has met a fair demand this week at 2, 3 and 4 cents for crossed, seconds and firsts, that of a superior quality in several instances obtained more. Upon enquiry we find dealers and those who ought to know, estimate the amount in first hands, on hand, at full one thousand hogheads, and but little more, if any, remaining during the last two weeks, for Liverpool 304 hbls, Hamburg 250, New York 382, Boston 368, Philadelphia 357, in all 1661.

Flour is plenty and without any demand, either for exportation or home consumption. It is said that there is a large portion of Flour in store, and that holders so far have refused submitting to prices lower than the ordinary sales for merchantable quality.

Whiskey is not over plenty, and sells in small parcels at 34 & 35 cents per gallon according to quality.

Cotton Baggings & Tule Rope (Kentucky). There is a moderate supply in few hands who are firm at 22 cents per yard for the former, and 10 cents per lb. for the latter. Tule Rope, we understand, is the most scarce of the two. Both articles are at moderate rates.
