CITY COUNCIL

Sitting of April 26, 1828.
As had been expected this sitting produced the greatest excitement, a crowd of persons was collected about the doors and filled that part of the Council-room reserved for spectators.

Whereas the 6th Section of the Act incorporating the city of New Orleans expressly declares, that the Council shall be the judges of the election of their members.

Whereas the article 873 of the code of practice contains the following provision: "When the Legislature has granted to a corporation the right to determine the validity of the election of its members or officers, courts of justice shall not issue mandamus for the purpose of enquiring into that fact."

Resolved, that the City Council, having solemnly passed upon the election of Samuel H. Harper, Esq. do hold, under the sanction of the law, that no Tribunal has a right to enquire into that question now; That, therefore, they do not recognize the jurisdiction of the first District Court of this State, as respects this question, and do actually refuse to obey the order or mandate issued, or any order or mandate which might be issued from the said Court, and might go to invalidate their decision.

The Provincial Legislature is further prorogued to the 8th of May. We are happy to understand that Mr. Spayner has addressed Mr. McLennan, the Post Master General of the United States, on the subject of the delay in the conveyance of the N. York mail.

Three parties, in each of which is a Surveyor, have proceeded up the rivers Eucharin and Chaudiere, to meet on the ground in dispute near the Boundary line between this province and the United States, near Mole Hill, with a view of taking further surveys of the fertile tract of country on the head waters of the river St. John.

The South Seas.—We have received a pamphlet from Washington, containing a Report of the committee on Naval Affairs in favor of the project of J. N. Reynolds, for an exploration of the South Seas. The measure is also sanctioned by the Secretary of the Navy, and there is much reason to believe it will receive the favorable consideration of Congress.

Whist.—The following is said to be a remarkable hand of cards, dealt by the Duke of Cumberland, as he was playing at whist, at the rooms, in Bath, England, by which he lost a wager of 20,000l., not winning one trick. The Duke's hand consisted of king, knave, nine and seven of trumps; (clubs); ace and king of diamonds; ace, king, queen and knave of hearts; and ace, king and queen of spades.
