The Chactaw nation vs. Eklen-Abé. The accused states that having been assaulted by three ruffians of his own nation, he, to avoid their fury was obliged to kill one of them, the other two took to flight.

On the evening of the trial Cap. Duille of the city guard at the request of Mr. Boulme, went on board of the schooner in which the condemned and his judges were embarked, and took out the already resigned Eklen-Abé; he was taken to the guard-house where he now is.

SOUTH AMERICA. Latest from Rio Janeiro and Brazil. We learn from the Baltimore papers that the schooner Elliot arrived there on Monday, in 38 days from Rio Janeiro.

A letter to the Editors of the Baltimore American, dated Dec. 13, says: "The United States Ship Boston sailed a few days ago on a cruise of a nature incognito. An English sloop of War, the Tribune has captured from the Brazilians the British brig Nestor, sugar laden from Santos for Valparaiso.

The Buenos Ayres Gazette of the 18th November, states that "the Portuguese have evacuated Colonia, and preparations were making for the departure of the imperial troops from Montevideo, leaving only 15000 men, stipulated in the treaty.

They believe with Montesquieu, that laws are ineffectual, unless sustained by good customs; and in that belief, are disposed to cement the foundation of the

moral and intellectual qualities of the citizens in whose hearts the vicious principles of insatuated Europe have not yet taken root.

With this view they have determined to transplant to Chihuahua the virtues and manners of the most learned and civilized nation of the world, in which the genius of well-doing has re-produced, from their paper ashes, the last rights of the human race; to which end they have enacted the decree of the 29th August.

Twelve youths are to be sent to the United States, to be educated at the expense of the State of Chihuahua.

Unworthy partisans of the legitimacy of the crowned monsters of Europa, who have in all ages degraded the greatest work of the creator,—tremble!! For if, in the opinion of Filangiere, the code of laws of Catherine II. was more formidable than the most numerous army, how much more powerful must appear a Republic of heroes, well instructed and perfectly systematized, and how tremendous the moral effect, when her Sister Republics strive for the honor of imitating and receiving her lessons, for the purpose of contributing to the destruction of tyranny and fanaticism!

Illustrious Legislators of the happy United States of the North! Wise and virtuous preceptors, whom alone the State of Chihuahua has believed capable of filling the immense space of its hopes! receive its dear sons, as the most conclusive proof of the fraternity, confidence and veneration, which in behalf of the State is offered to you by its Representative.

THE TURKISH WAR.—A correspondent of the London Courier (Dec. 22) who appears to be master of his subject writes thus after reading the Russian bulletin which we published a few days since.

"I am more than ever confirmed in the opinion I stated last week, (in opposition to the stack jabbing letter from Semlin), that the 2d and 3d Russian Corps only have retreated, and that the 6th and 7th still remain cantoned on the strong and woody heights around Varna, and between Varna and Bazardjid."

The following facts he considers as satisfactory ascertained:

- 1. That redoubts are erecting in the neighborhood of the Turkish fortresses by the Russians.
2. That 30,000 Russians are to guard Eastern Wallachia, and secure it from any serious invasion.
3. That reinforcements are coming down from the interior of Russia.
4. That General Langeron has fixed his head quarters at Bucharest for the winter.
5. That General Roth has gone from Silistria, with a portion of the troops, to Varna.
6. That a great Russian force is between Brazarajik and Varna; a letter from Bucharest says 50,000 men, but this is probably exaggerated.
7. That the Grand Vizier's head quarters were, about the 8th and 9th Nov. at Aidos; and the Turks were entrenching and fortifying that camp. He had been joined there by Chalik Pacha, who commands the new Turkish regulars.

If therefore, the Turks have any serious designs of molesting the Russian army encamped near Varna, the next advices from Constantinople must announce his having quitted the Camp of Aidos with a heavy battering train. This is most improbable at this season."

BARK BREAD.—We are informed by Linnaeus that the Laplanders eat, during a great part of the winter, a preparation of the inner bark of the pine, which they call bark bread. It is prepared in the following manner:—The tallest and least branchy trees are selected; the dry scaly external bark is then carefully taken off; and the soft, white fibrous matter collected and dried. The time of the year chosen for this process, is when the Alburnum is soft and easily separated from the wood, by gentle pulling. To convert it to use, it is slowly baked on live coals; and being thus rendered porous and hard, is ground into powder which is kneaded with water into cakes, and baked in an oven.—Stevenson and Churchill's Medical Botany.
