NEW ORLEANS: THURSDAY, AUGUST 20, 1829

New-York, July 25. Latest from Europe. — We are indebted to a mercantile house in this city, for the loan of Glasgow papers to the 15th of June inclusive, received by the arrival this forenoon, of the ship Jean Hastie, in 39 days from Greenock. They contain London dates of the 12th of June, five days later than before received.

The most important articles they furnish are two Russian bulletins. The first is dated May 11, and only announces the passage of the Danube at three different points. The second is dated from the camp before Silistria (22d May,) detailing the preparations which are making to carry on the siege with the utmost activity.

The bulletin says that the enemy remain quiet and seldom disturb even the Russian outposts which are stationed at only 300 fathoms from the counterscarp of the place. The remainder of the bulletin relates to the advantages gained over the Turks led on by the Grand Vizer in person, who left Shumla with the intention of attacking Pravadi with 15,000 men, and was afterwards repulsed with 10,000 more; but he was ultimately defeated, after a hard and furious fighting, with the loss of 2,000 of his troops, and was forced to retire to Siunila. The Russians lost 1,000 men.

A postscript to the Bulletin informs, that a courier had just arrived from Admiral Greig, with news that the Turkish fleet which had entered the Black Sea, had hastened back to the Bosphorus, on learning that the Russian fleet was going to meet them. Immediately after the hasty retreat of the Turkish fleet, the commander of the Russian fleet reinforced his squadron, stationed off the Channel of Constantinople, and ordered some ships to cruise on the coast of Naxos, the result of which was, that about 2) Turkish transports fell into their hands, and a new frigate was set on fire near Schilli, not far from Bosphorus.

The Dublin Evening Post says, that on Sunday the 8th of June, Mr. O'Connell left Dublin for Ennis, and as he proceeded through the intervening towns was followed, met and greeted by thousands anxious for his success. The whole population of the country in some places seemed to be out bearing green branches in their hands, so that the road had almost the appearance of a continued grove. At the towns where he arrived in the night the windows were illuminated. At Limerick they drew up a lofty tree before the door of his hotel, in the top of which several musicians played national airs. The people in the mean time gathered about the hotel, and when O'Connell was ready to set out again, there were about 40,000 persons collected in the streets. As the procession moved on it increased to such a degree that the journalists do not pretend to estimate its numbers. At the Ennis side of Cratloe wood O'Connell made a short harangue to the people, reminding them that that spot he first addressed them on the first election. He made them multitude another speech at Six Mile Cross, accusing Sir Edward O'Brien, who has two sons in Parliament — one representing the country, and the other the borough of Ennis, of having broken his promise to support O'Connell's right to sit in Parliament. For this he said Sir Edward's son would soon walk out of the country, and that when he got into Parliament he would drag before the country the monopoly and corruption the borough represented by the other son. This declaration was followed by tremendous cheering.

The multitude now became so dense that O'Connell's carriage could only move at the rate of a mile an hour, and it was near one o'clock on Tuesday morning before he reached Ennis. Here he again harangued the people, observing that he had addressed them five times the day before and four times already on that day — that he was, therefore, exhausted in body, but that his spirit and his resolution to serve them were inexhaustible. He said Wellington and Peel had done to him and to his fellow citizens gross, palpable and paltry injustice when he forced upon them the measure of emancipation. He was sure, he said, that the electors would not give those men an opportunity of repeating their injustices towards them. (As Mr. O'Connell said this cries were heard of, No, no — we will return you.) Mr. O'Connell proceeded to complain of the taking away of the forty shilling franchise, and said that he was sure they would give him an opportunity of having that franchise restored. — He said that he had promised them religious freedom and had procured it for them. They were now free, and the Brunswickers, who would turn up the whites of their eyes while they put their hands slyly into the pockets of the Catholics, and who would discount God Almighty for the ready money, were no longer their masters. The Brunswick clubs of Dublin had sent down poor Bambo and his land-calf brother to disfranchise the brave freholders, and crooked-eyed Fitzgerald was

on their side. He called on the Gentry of Clare to separate themselves from the Dublin bloodhounds and join what was intended for the good of the people. He inquired what good any member had ever done in Parliament for the Country of Clare, except to get places for his relations, and he promised that he would not be six months in Parliament before all their oppressions would be done away. After several other observations of similar purport he promised the people to address them again the next day, and assured them that they should hear from him often through the newspapers and otherwise.

One of the Dublin Anti-Catholic papers says that Mr. O'Connell has not the slightest chance of being elected. There is a report that Mr. Vesey Fitzgerald will appear as candidate against him.

From the Glasgow Courier, June 16. LONDON, June 13. — Accounts from Jassy of the 23d ult. in the Messenger, do not contain any new or important intelligence. They confirm, however, the previous statement of the loss which the Russians suffered in the passage of the Danube at Hirsove. Three regiments which first crossed it were surprised by the Turks and most severely handled. The information furnished us by our correspondent at Wallachia, of the progress of the plague at Bucharest, proves to be but too true. — [Courier.]

GREECE — Official advices have been received by the English Government from the Ionian Islands of the surrender of Missolonghi, Antolice, and Castle Lepanto, to the Greeks. Letters from Corfu positively affirm that Count Capo d'Istria is resolved to resign the government of Greece, and will soon publish a declaration on that subject.

LATEST FROM LISBON. — Says the Boston Gazette of Thursday, "Capt. M'Lellan arrived at this port yesterday from Lisbon, having sailed 2d June, but brought no papers. Capt. M'L. informs that the "reign of terror" still continued. Arrests and imprisonments were daily made, and the greatest fear prevailed all ranks except the satellites and adherents of Don Miguel."

FROM ST. MICHAEL. — By a slip from the Boston Palladium office, we learn that the Boa Nova, from St. Michael 8th June, brings information of the arrival of 1500 troops in that Island from Lisbon, and that others were daily expected to complete a force of 2500 to 3000 men, to proceed against Terceira. A ship of the line and a frigate which were blockading Terceira, had sent into St. Michael two English vessels, one bound in, and the other out of Terceira — the latter was released, but the former was discharging her cargo in deposit.

Gen. Jackson and Mr. Van Buren, Secretary of State, made a visit last week to the venerable Charles Carroll, at his summer residence, near Baltimore. On Saturday he passed through the latter city in company with A. J. Donaldson, Esq. and two of the ladies of General Jackson's family, to Philadelphia.

The Newport Mercury of Saturday says: We regret to learn, that several extensive Manufacturing establishments at Pawtucket, have failed within a few days past.

COUNTERFEITS OF THE BOSTON BANK. — Large quantities of counterfeit five dollar notes of the Boston Bank have been put into circulation. They are signed J. Chapman, Cashier; J. T. Athorp, President; and made payable to R. Lash. All this is, of course, in conformity to the true bills. These gentlemen have occupied the places of President, Cashier, and First Teller of the Bank, for the last fifteen or twenty years; and this is the same plate (as we believe,) which has been counterfeited through the whole term of their administration, and how much longer we know not, and with a success greater than has attended this operation of rogues with any other bill in the United States. — The engraving of the true plate is bad; the paper which the Bank uses is bad; the whole appearance is that of a counterfeit. The word FIVE on the left, the arms of Massachusetts in the centre, the figures 5 on each corner, all look most remarkably suspicious. We think the community have a right to complain that the Bank should persist in sending forth this miserable work, when the Directors know that for at least fifteen years it has been the cause of constant frauds. If they can't afford to use Perkins' plate, they shall have a contribution by way of assistance. But we would advise them, at any rate, to send their plate, that miserable relic of antiquity, to the New England Museum. It is the only thing of the kind which now dishonors the Banks of Boston. This last emission will cost the community, we presume, at least twenty thousand dollars.

Baltimore, July 17. We learn that during the storm yesterday evening, a sail boat containing nine persons was capized in the river, between Whetstone Point and Harris's Creek. The boat is said to have sunk as soon as she went over, and six of the number were drowned. The occurrence was witnessed by several persons at Littlejohn's tavern, two of whom, Messrs. George W. Ellis and George Leary, put off in a very small boat, and by great exertions succeeded in picking up three of the men belonging to the sail boat. The extreme smallness of the boat prevented them from taking in any more. The men who picked up reported the names of their lost companion, to be Thomas Toiden; Richard Smith, and his son, a lad of 8 or 9 years; James Tazin, Thomas B'got, and James O'Conner. This melancholy information was communicated to us a late hour last night, by the young gentlemen who were at Littlejohn's at the time of the storm. They add that several sail boats were capized during the same squall.
