A large number of citizens assembled at the Exchange last evening, pursuant to notice, to express their sentiments on the subject of the adjustment of the tariff, at its present condition.

To afford our readers an idea of the probabilities of the passage through the house of representatives, of the bill which has passed the senate, to renew the charter of the Bank of the United States, we copy, in another column, from the National Intelligencer, a report of the proceedings on that body on the second day of its session.

The Bank Bill has been postponed (by its friends) in the House of Representatives, and made the special order of the day for Monday next. This arrangement would seem to indicate a belief that the Tariff discussion will be brought to a close in all this week.

At length, a choice of Representatives in Congress has been made in the large constituency in the State of Vermont, whereby Hazen Allen has been elected to a seat in that body, and may be expected in a few days to take his seat.

We wish we could say the same of the District in Massachusetts which has so long remained vacant.

UNITED STATES BANK.

WASHINGTON, June 13. In the house of representatives, yesterday, the bill to renew and modify the charter of the U. S. Bank, which has passed the senate, came up in the House of business, and was received with favor, as a matter of course.

Mr. Whitley moved that the bill be taken up as second reading. It was read accordingly; when Mr. McDuffie moved that it be committed to a Committee of the Whole House, and made the order of the day for to-morrow.

The consideration of the bill was postponed to the first Monday in November next.

Mr. McDuffie said, that unless the gentleman from Ohio wished to forego all discussion of this bill, he would be glad to have it taken up as second reading, and after the bill he will take his regular course.

Mr. Thompson said he felt himself incompetent to enter into a discussion of the bill. He was a young man, and unused to public speaking. But he was satisfied the House had sat long enough for one session, and that it was time the session should be put on end.

The discussion of this bill could not be disposed of in less than three months. For his own part, he wanted to go home. He was desirous that the House, when it acted on this bill, should act understandingly that they should have an opportunity of knowing the bill, and its contents in regard to it. The bill was now in a tangible shape, and the people, having it before them, would be able to compare the bill proposed with the charter of the present Bank, and recommend the passage or rejection of the bill, as they might think proper.

When he was elected to this House, he had intended to call for a vote on this question, and he had had his constituents expected any such thing. He had been taken by surprise; his constituents had been taken by surprise. Mr. T. said that it was impossible that the House could with any propriety pass the bill at this session.

For himself, he was unopposed. He wished only to do what was right. He said from 60 to 80 letters to the Bank—he rather thought he might himself vote for it. He thought it unlikely we must have a Bank; but whether it should be the Bank now proposed, or the people to decide. If there was to be a Bank, he wanted that Government should get it on the first trial, and he would vote for it on that issue.

Mr. J. W. Hunt, of Connecticut, rose to order. As this was a bill which had passed the Senate, he inquired of the Chair whether a motion of postponement beyond the limits of the present session was not equivalent to a motion for the bill to be postponed.

The Chair replied in the affirmative. A motion to postpone the bill to a certain time is confined to some day within the session.

After some conversation as to the order of business, Mr. Thompson said he had understood that all business lying over unfinished, at the end of the first session, went on as it stood, at the commencement of the next session.
