### FOREIGN PAUPERISM AND CRIME.

One of the leading objects of the American party is to prevent that introduction among us of foreign pauperism and crime—that spirit of vagabondage which is now rampant in all the states of the Union, and, in fact, of the world; and nothing is more abominable. Panorama is becoming a slaving social evil in the United States. The statistics furnished by the last census prove that a foreign population about one-half is in the United States, that is, one-half of the population of the country, and that a large number of paupers is at the public expense. The statistics of crime would show that the same is not less striking. Twenty years ago a mendicant was a spectacle unknown in our city. Now they swarm in every thoroughfare. Who ever beheld an American beggar, unless he happened to be blind, or deprived of the use of his limbs? But here in New Orleans, we are infested with multitudes of professional mendicants, who, from infamy and misery, are invariably rogues, and belong to that class of pauper emigrants who annually abandon the over-populated countries of the old world, to prey upon the charity and kindness of the new.

We need hardly say that such actions to our people are by no means desirable; that pauperism is a grievous burden to the community, and a breedingevil to the public welfare. To such an extent have these two prominent nuisances been felt, that the Federal Government itself, with all its deadly and persistent animosity to the American party, is compelled to take notice of them, and to place on their guard those cities which are most exposed to the irritation. This our worthy Mayor—himself an old line Democrat of the South, and a man of great ability, who informs his authorities that the Emigration Agents of Britain have made publications, advising, delinquent, and emigrated emigrants against taking passage to New York, as the laws of that State forbid their landing, but counselling them to come to New Orleans or Baltimore, where no such regulations exist. The Mayor, however, has written to the U. S. State Department, and the U. S. Consul at Liverpool; and acting proper upon him, has put forth the following timely warning:

JOHN L. LEWIS, Mayor of the city of New Orleans, State of Louisiana, have despatched to the Secretary of State, and of the Laws of the State, and of the City of New Orleans, to issue this circular for the purpose of giving notice to all the citizens of the State, and of the City, that it is now more than expedient, to keep the paupers, of the character stated, and impose the obligation on masters of ships, to prohibit their landing, who, from whatever cause, may, within two years after their arrival, become a public charge, or a public burthen, to the public funds, and to the public welfare of the State, and of the City of New Orleans, in such a manner, as the Mayor may think proper, not exceeding three hundred dollars.

And I do, therefore, hereby notify all persons who have any knowledge of the visitors of the law on this subject will be exonerated, and the editor of the law will be in a position to give me information.

Now we ask any fair and impartial citizen, if it is not high time for the people of the United States to end their protection against all kinds of paupers, to let the law, the half, and the mind who threaten to invade our shores, to eat out our substance, to amalgamate their equal, vice and ignorance, to become manufactured into patient citizens, and, under the leadership of artful demagogues, to undermine our institutions? We are not, if not just in our desire to have our national institutions surrounded with sufficient safeguards, and that the term of probation should be largely extended, when such as these are to become the recipients of the blessings of citizenship; when that modus inclusus, of crime and mendacity is to be infused into our healthy body politic, like a mildew, blasting its wholeborn brother?

Can a sterner picture of the ills of the world, of inflicting American paupers, be presented, than is embodied within this very proclamation—an official paper which the Executive of New Orleans deems himself bound in duty to issue, for the purpose of warning our citizens that a plague worse than that of miasma, or fury, or any affliction which visited Phœnix, or any of its inhabitants, is about to descend upon us?

Our paper, having had the honor of presenting this circular, and the resolution of the Legislature, for the removal and annulled manumission of the slaves, for the benefit of the colored, and the colored are to be the first to receive it.
