Para los gastos de transporte de estas legaciones y establecimiento de casa, se abonará por una sola vez a cada ministro o encargado de negocios, la cantidad que el supremo gobierno juzgare bastante al efecto...

Todos los individuos que se empleen en estas legaciones comenzarán a disfrutar el sueldo que se les señala, conforme a lo dispuesto en este decreto, desde el día en que se les designe...

Quando los secretarios de legación funcionen de encargados de negocios por ausencia, muerte o imposibilidad física o moral de los ministros o encargados de negocios, disfrutarán de la mitad del sueldo asignado a éstos.

Los encargos de ministro plenipotenciario, encargado de negocios y secretario de ambos, serán amovibles segun lo estimare conveniente el gobierno.

Se derogon los decretos y demás disposiciones expedidas hasta la fecha sobre legaciones, a excepcion de las relativas a la de la asamblea general americana.

From the Daily Advertiser. FROM MEXICO.—By the schr. Splendid, we received, on Saturday, Vera Cruz papers, from our correspondent, to the 14th of November.

We find no confirmation of the reported interference of General Santa Anna in the affairs of the national cabinet; on the contrary, the general quietness and calm which pervade the country, are happy auguries of its future undisturbed repose...

Guerrero has taken several important steps, particularly in relation to the revenue, which, it is thought, will excite considerable discussion, if they come before the Congress.

Some of the states are complained of for not paying their contingents to the General Government, and some of the legislature are said to be employing themselves on subjects of no importance, though an enquiry is passed on a number of others, which are said to be devoting their attention to matters of immediate local interest.

We find a list of promotions in the army, made by President Guerrero, in the exercise of his extraordinary powers. They are thirty two in number, and are principally below the rank of Lieut. Colonel.

The papers are loudly demanding of the President the resignation of the extraordinary powers conferred upon him by the Congress, on the appearance of the Spanish expedition. It is probable that he is waiting for the next session to resign them.

Guatemala.—The Antorcha of Guatemala under date of Oct. 23, mentions that a division belonging to the liberating army, under the command of Col. Gutierrez, left there on the 25th Sept., to pacify the state of Nicaragua, and the revolutionized portion of Honduras. No doubt is expressed concerning the result.

On the 7th of Sept. ex-president Arce, and C. M. Aycinena left Guatemala for one of the northern ports. About the 11th, a conspiracy was discovered in that city to overturn the government, which was prevented.

We are informed, by Captain Chapman, of the brig Athenian, arrived last evening, from Cartagena, that all was tranquil at that place, and in the interior, when he sailed. The rebellion in the province of Antioquia, headed by Gen. Cordova, was quelled by a detachment of troops sent against them by Bolivar.

A writer in the Charleston Courier, an opposition paper, in discussing the question of Georgia and the Indians, takes the part of the aborigines with considerable warmth, exclaiming against the attempts of Georgia and Al-

abama to extend their jurisdiction over them, as acts of great injustice. His view of the subject is, that if the Indians are permitted to remain in their present situation, their race will shortly become extinct, that the best way of disposing of the Greeks and Cherokees would be to suffer them to remain as they are, subject to the gradual extermination which necessarily results from living in the immediate neighborhood of civilized men...

It is well known, that the ancient tribe of Catawba Indians have, for the last twenty or thirty years, held quiet possession of an extensive and valuable reserve, in one of the healthiest and most desirable parts of the State...

GRECE.—The President, Count Capo d'Istria was at Poros on the 5th September.—Four thousand Albanians, with 3000 best of burthen loaded with provisions had penetrated the passes of Mount Ota, and reached the plains of Turkochori, where they halted two days for the purpose of reconnoitring.
