To hight the city by gas is vertenily an object of as public importance, as of general and manifest utility. The practicability of the work is sufficiently tested by the experiments already made here, not less than by similar works in tall tide of successful operation in most of the principal cities in this country, and in Europe. When they make contracts, their terms for the city should be precisely those as any individual would or could make on his own respona bility in a sumilar case. If the terms for posts, pives and lamps as proposed by the company to the city, exceed those which are granted and accepted by individuals, the city council would, impose upon their constituents by agreeing to them. But if they are as reasonable as could be expected why not accept them? If they are extravagant, moderate them; but let them not be rejected wholly,

Advices have been received from Havana to the 19 h uft.
