The Editor of this paper respectfully announces to his friends and others in both houses of the legislature that he is a candidate for re-election and that should be elected he will perform the duties of his station to the utmost of his means.

FRANCOIS GARDNER, Esq. was again re-elected state treasurer yesterday, by a very large majority of both houses of the legislature. This re-elected official confidence and esteem must be highly gratifying to him and his numerous personal friends. There are few more public officers equally efficient as he; and few more whose case affords a strong argument in favor of frequent elections.

STATE PAPER. There are many arguments in favor of the law being appointed the state paper.

1. It has the greatest circulation of any paper in the state—probably more than any other.

2. It circulates more extensively among both classes of the Louisiana population; and the laws and legislative proceedings and executive documents should be published in both languages.

3. Since it has been acquired, and new type and printing apparatus been acquired, it possesses greater facility for executing the work ordered than it had previously; and could probably perform it cheaper than any other newspaper.

4. Any argument regarding his former contracts are therefore void in respect to the proposed, and should have no effect in the minds of any disinterested gentlemen.

DR. GREEN EYED MONSTER.

After the eastern mail of yesterday, we received Philadelphia papers and Washington papers of the 6th inst. There had been no late arrivals from Europe; nor any action in any respect tending to elucidate the state of our relations with France. The charges were made on both sides, and the cause of the rupture between France and Russia is a *coup d'etat* on the part of Louis Philippe to hasten the acceptance as signatory of the explanation expected from and given by the emperor.

On Monday the 4th inst. and Tuesday the 5th very little was done in either house of Congress, but the presentation of petitions and resolutions, which have not produced no decided result. Except that in the senate, a bill had been presented to secure the Smithsonian legacy; and one read a second time to amend the judicial system of the U. S. district and circuit courts.

As a matter of course, however, some movements made in both houses of Congress relating to public lands, which we shall notice tomorrow.

Signor Diego Chalaros has been recognized by the president as vice consul of Portugal for the port of New Orleans.

Miss Mississippian Ohio river is now in navigable order for large boats.

We are pleased that Dr. Brushner has taken our remarks yesterday in good part; and we beg leave to assure him and every other member of the legislature, that when we shall hereafter make any remarks on the subject of his bill, we will be as courteous as possible to the man from his proceedings; and but exercise the privileges of a free press, guaranteed by the constitution to comment on all things affecting the interests of the public. All citizens are free to express an opinion on the bill, and we shall be glad to receive and publish the same as a contribution to the public mind. The members who act wisely and well will be pleased to have their conduct noticed by the press for their encouragement.
