

## CITY WILL GET WAR INDUSTRIES

## RATES WILL BE DISCUSSED SOON

New Orleans is not to be entirely left out in the distribution of industries arising from the war. The construction of a great airplane factory, to manufacture airplanes for the United States and the Entente allies has already been started by the Richardson Aeroplane corporation on the shore of Lake Pontchartrain, and will be rushed to completion.

The new plant will produce the Richardson tandem biplane, a powerful machine capable of carrying a heavy load, and one which is said to be peculiarly adapted to the needs of the government for coast guard patrol service, or the carrying of the mails. The tandem biplane is the product of two years of experiment under the supervision of the prominent aeronautical engineers of the country, and recent tests made by the Navy Department of its model at Washington indicated that the greatest feature of it is construction of its longitudinal stability, which automatically prevents it from assuming an angle of inclination or deviation greater than ten degrees.

The first consignment of material has arrived and has been unloaded and additional materials for the assembling of airplanes are being secured as fast as possible. President Richardson says the first machine of the plant will be built with all speed, commensurate with skill and caution, so that the official test flights can be made within sixty days. It is expected to make a long distance naval aeronautical station as soon as possible under the supervision of naval experts of the aerial division. Naval attaches of the Entente allies and other friendly governments will be present.

### WANTS \$50,000 FOR CARE OF PET POODLE

Charleston, S. C., June 23.—Care of a pet dog will cost the estate of the late Mrs. Frank Leslie, widow of the publisher, \$50,000, if the suit instituted by Miss Anna S. Simons, of this city, is successful.

Mrs. Leslie left the bulk of her \$1,800,000 estate to suffrage, but she also bequeathed \$10,000 to Miss Simons for services to her pet poodle. This the Charleston girl spurns and insists that the trouble she has to undergo for the sake of the dog is worth at least \$50,000. On one occasion, Miss Simons says, she was abused by Mrs. Leslie because she refused to take the dog out for exercise on Broadway while dressed only in a kimono. She claims she was forced to take the pet out while clad simply in a kimono and a rain coat.

## Danger of Tuberculosis Lurks on the Battlefields

Arrangements of special freight rate schedules by which the government will be enabled to obtain prompt delivery of shipbuilding materials at minimum expense will be the subject of a series of conferences to be held at Washington during the coming week.

A. G. T. Moore, assistant secretary of the Southern Pine association, left Saturday night for the capital, where he will confer with David L. Ewing, traffic manager of the United States Shipping Board Emergency Fleet corporation, regarding existing rates on materials for ship construction from lumber mills to shipyards. The problem is complicated by the fact that domestic rates are high, and in many cases there are no through rates in effect; hence the combination of local rates would result in the government paying excessive charges.

### To Cooperate With I. C. C.

It is proposed to have the Shipping Board, in co-operation with the carriers and the Interstate Commerce commission, fix the rates at which the material will move.

The matter of car supply will also be taken up with Mr. Ewing, and an effort made to effect an arrangement similar to that in existence on the eastbound schedules.

While in Washington Mr. Moore will also attend the reconsignment meeting June 25. Every effort will be made by the association to support tariffs proposed by carriers which have a tendency to minimize abuse of the reconsigning practice.

### Several Thousand Cars

General belief prevails among manufacturers of Southern pine that, after the temporary relief afforded by the passage of the Esch bill last month, which was followed by the sending of several thousand empty cars to the South, the car shortage will become even tighter than it was before. This will be due in part to the heavy movement of government materials expected during August, which will necessitate the commandeering of many cars that would otherwise go into the domestic trade. Another factor being considered is the near approach of the crop-moving season, which always entails a heavy burden on the roads.

With these things neglected, tuberculosis now actually threatens to dominate France. Its ravages in Belgium are horrible. Austria-Hungary, Russia, Italy and Germany are feeling the acute sting of the white plague, and England, although better prepared than all the rest, is finding tuberculosis an enormous wartime problem.

The United States is now entering upon the same war and the same kind of warfare that has lighted up the tuberculosis scourge of Europe. We are better prepared to meet the problem than France or Belgium. We are not nearly so well prepared as Great Britain.

The central government of England has found itself unable to care for the returned consumptive soldiers and the increasing number of cases in the civil population, and France, now working frantically, hopes to have 15,000 sanatorium beds by the end of the year to care for these consumptives. Belgium has seen her actively tuberculous population increased between 180 and 200 per cent in the past two years.

In my opinion, if we have actual war, the United States will need sanatoria, dispensaries, visiting nurse service and farm colonies in every county in every state in the union.

### BRITISH ARMY'S "KID" OFFICER ON DUTY HERE
