Art. 1er. A dater de la publication de la présente ordonnance, nul ne pourra établir ou faire établir une guinguette et distillerie dans l'enceinte de la ville et dans aucun de ses faubourgs incorporés.

Art. 2. Toute personne qui enfreindra la présente ordonnance, payera par chaque contravention une amende, qui ne sera pas moins de cent piastres, et en outre une amende de cinq piastres par jour, jusqu'à ce que la guinguette ou distillerie construite en contravention soit démolie.

Art. 3. A dater de la publication de la présente ordonnance, nulle boulangerie ne pourra être établie dans les limites incorporées de la cité de la N. Orléans, dans d'autres-bâties que celles faites en briques et couvertes en tuiles, ardoises ou autres matériaux non combustibles, et toute personne en contradiction avec les dispositions du présent article, payera une amende de cent piastres, et en outre cinq piastres par jour jusqu'à ce que la boulangerie qui aurait été construite en contravention du présent article, soit démolie.
