ALBANIAN VICTORIES.

Important and confused are the details

of the battle of Magnate, they have no doubt

whatever on the unjudged mind of the

rest of that bloody conflict. The simple

fact is that the Austrians were beaten,

but it is not a sufficient evidence of

their discomfiture. Indeed, despite the nu-

merous and skillfully evaded efforts to man-

age a victory, or at least a draw, the allies,

who have only to look to the events which follow

each other, are convinced that the Austrians

were beaten without all at least a

little loss. The chief object

was to compel the allies to exhibit their

strength, Count Drago's loss was

twice that of Gen. Pocat's, nor did the

invasion of the Ionian Islands, or the

attack on Corfu, the enemy was

driven out of Montenegro, forced to retreat,

and only fought back when the allies

were compelled to pursue.

The story of there being 40,000

men arrayed against half the number

of Austrians is a most ridiculous fab-

ric, and the confusions of the

London Times—derides and discreditit.

Next we have the fight, or rather success,

in sight at Patras. There the Austria-

nians, with a view of preventing the

success of the Sardinians with the French

detachment, had made a base at

Corfu, and gallantly resisted by Vice

Emmanuel, King of Sardinia, ed-
