Report says that the U. S. frigate Constellation, which is preparing for sea at Norfolk, will take out Messrs. McLane and Rives, our Ministers to England and France, and then proceed to the Mediterranean.

Our claims upon France.—It is said in the Richmond Enquirer, that instructions are at this moment in preparation for Mr. Rives, which are as full and conclusive as any that can be made out for a Special Minister touching all the points connected with the Claims upon France.

From the New-York American.

We take from the Daily Advertiser, this morning the account of the explosion of the steam frigate, at New-York, on the 25th inst. We are informed by a gentleman who was present, that there were only five barrels of powder in the magazine, and that in a damaged state.

The following is a continuation of the list of killed: J. T. D. Burgen; Thomas Williams, gunner; Win. A. Lehmann, Jan. Pierce, 1st seaman.

Between 2 and 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon an explosion took place on board the steam frigate Fulton, lying at the Navy Yard, Brooklyn.

This dreadful accident was occasioned by the Gunner's going into the Magazine, to procure powder to fire the evening gun. It was cautioned by one of the officers previously to his going below, to be careful; and soon after, the explosion took place.

There were attached to the Fulton, on the roll of the ship, 143 persons; and at the time of the explosion, there were supposed to have been on board the vessel from 60 to 100 persons.

Commodore Chauncey was on board the Fulton yesterday inspecting the ship; and killed, in company with John F. Newton Esq, who commands the Fulton, only ten of fifteen minutes before the explosion.

Lieut. Platt, who was severely wounded, had returned from a month's absence only yesterday morning.

The room in which the officers were dining, was situated about midships. The whole company at the table were forced, by the concussion with such violence as to break their limbs, and otherwise cut and bruise them in a shocking manner.

Direct from Smyrna. By a letter received from an officer on board the Lexington at Smyrna, dated 19th March, we learn that the Russians have crossed the Danube with an army of 400,000 strong, bound to Constantinople where provisions were very scarce—even the dogs in the streets were starving; so our Consul, who had just arrived from that city informed them.

Late from Europe. Havre, May 1st.—The affair of the Slavee who in spite of the English succeeded in landing his negroes at Guadalupe has been made the pretext of aggression upon that colony of France, by acts which at any other time would not be reproved. An English frigate was sent to reclaim the slaves, but the officers, not content with demanding justice from the Governor, were desirous to do it for themselves. They landed in armed boats, and sought for the new negroes in the houses where they supposed them to be concealed, and not satisfied with this, they invited to destruction the slaves of the planters.

Paris May 2.—Four Chinese sent to Europe by the Lazarite Missionaries were presented to the King, on Wednesday, at his return from the Chapel. They are from twenty to twenty six years of age. One of them speaks Latin fluently and the other understood that language. They were educated by Father Lamol, who has been established at Peking, since 1787, and has been interpreter of European languages for the Emperor, but has now been exiled for having formed a christian school. The Lazarite who superintended the school has been strangled. After four or five years more of study, they will carry back to their country, the spiritual doctrines which alone can relieve the moral character of a people who are groaning under a yoke which restrains the intellect.

There is a rumour in the Constitution from Vienna, by a private letter, that by advices from Cronstadt, the Russian had gained a victory on the borders of Saxony. The Turks whose force was strong fought bravely but were defeated with the loss of 12 pieces of artillery, a quantity of ammunition and provision and 1200 prisoners, among whom several Agas and Ulemas.

We stated a day or two ago that affairs could not remain in France in statu quo; either there must be a dissolution of the Chamber of Deputies, or a change of Ministry. It appears from the Paris Papers of Monday and Tuesday that the former measure will in all probability be adopted. It is rather singular that persons and parties of the most opposite principles are equally loud in their clamour for dissolution. M. Benjamin Constant and the Journal des Debats are for once on the same side. The former insists that the Ministry does not exist—and that the present Chamber scarcely exists—Ergo—then there ought to be an appeal to the nation. The latter declares that if it be delayed, we shall perhaps be without Ministers, and without Chambers; with a bankrupt Treasury, a discontented and impoverished nation; and Europe once more hazarding the chances of a general and terrible war. This is a gloomy picture indeed of France.—But the necessity of some change is imperative. The attitude of the Chamber has been unsteady and vacillating. Anticipations of what its opinion may be to-morrow, founded on the opinion it has expressed to-day would be erroneous. The following is the rapid outline sketched by the able hand of the Editor of the Journal des Debats:—

"The Chamber has for some time presented an extraordinary spectacle. Where is the majority? To the right? No: witness the reference of a certain petition to the Minister of Ecclesiastical Affairs; witness the adoption, yet quite recent of that persecuting amendment which will not permit an Archbishop, with an income of 50,000 francs a year to share in the endowment to this

rejection of a hundred other amendments, and the uncertainty of a scrutiny. Is it then in the two centres united? Perhaps it would if the two centres were to unite. But what if the two centres were to unite, one-third of the right centre votes with the left side; and then, at 5 o'clock, a third of the left centre, by way of compliment no doubt, votes with the right centre and side. The chamber is astonished at these unexpected revolutions—the public is afflicted, and asks how it happens that among the Representatives of France there is neither unity nor steadiness of principle?"

It does appear, from this sketch, that the King has no other alternative. A change of Ministers might take place without any change in the attitude or actions of the Chamber. An appeal to the nation may afford an opportunity for the expression of the real sentiments and wishes of the people.

But though the necessity may be urgent, the time seems to be most inconvenient. No great measure has yet been decided—the financial business has scarcely been touched—the budget has not been voted—and the campaign in the East is on the point of being resumed—and the Greek question is yet to be settled.—These it may be said, are questions which belong more to the executive than the legislative departments—but circumstances may arise on a sudden which might require an immediate appeal to the legislature.

The want of unity and co-operation between the Ministers and the French Chamber is an aggravation of the pressure under which France is laboring in her agriculture, her manufacture, and her trade, both internal and external. We shall be glad to see this pressure removed or diminished, because our own prosperity and welfare are intimately connected with the prosperity and welfare of other nations, particularly with that of France.

France, or what in a political sense is the same thing, Paris has also its difficulties. The nomination of Count de Laet Montmorency, as Minister for foreign affairs, does not afford satisfaction to any party, apparently, nor impart strength to the Minister.—M. de Montmorency, like the Duke of Northumberland, who was sent to conciliate Ireland, which, happily, the concession of the Catholic Claims did for him, has a great name, and great personal respectability; but he has not the force which his new appointment, and circumstances of the times require. He was when appointed Ambassador at Vienna, and had not reached Paris. Mautisme feebleness, and a vacillating, unpurposed system, seems to have marked the course of the Ministers, so as to have exposed them, alternately, to the opposition of all parties, until it had become a serious question, whether the Ministry would not be dissolved or the Chamber of Deputies? The latter alternative would probably be adopted.

From the Daily Advertiser. STILL LATTER FROM ENGLAND. By the ship Mentor, Captain Webb, arrived late last night which sailed from Liverpool on the 10th May, we have received Liverpool papers of the 9th, and London of the 8th of May. By the ship Richmond, which also arrived last evening, London papers of the 9th are received.

London, May 8th.—Despatches dated Lisbon, 15th ult. have been received at the Foreign Office from Mr. M. Lewis the British Consul at Lisbon, at which period Mr. Noble, Jr. had not been released.

The riots in the manufacturing districts have unhappily produced the consequence that had been apprehended. Blood had been shed. Five men have been killed at Rochdale, and twenty five wounded. For some time there had been discontents among the woolen & flannel manufactories, against some of the masters who pay lower wages. It was therefore resolved to destroy their looms, &c. They carried their intentions into effect, a riot ensued; the military were called out and a great number of rioters were taken into custody and committed to Lancaster Castle. A large mob assembled before the Castle, for the purpose of liberating them. They attacked the soldiers with stones and wounded one. A party of cavalry arrived who fired on the mob, killed five and wounded twenty-five.

All the efforts to bring about an armistice between the Greeks and Turks in the Island of Candia, (an armistice which was the first object of the treaty of 6th July) have failed. The Greeks continue to devastate the country. The war has not been suspended for one moment.
