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RAINFALL ALMOST SETS RECORD

Records of the last 29 years almost were approached by the rainfall Friday between 3 and 4 p. m., according to Dr. I. D. Cline, of the New Orleans Weather Bureau. The rainfall exactly was 1.85 inches and between 3:20 and 3:25 p. m. exactly was one-half inch.

The maximum wind velocity was thirty miles an hour, while the extreme velocity for one minute reached thirty-three miles an hour. The temperature took a sudden drop shortly after the advent of the high wind and heavy rain. At 3 o'clock the thermometer in Dr. Cline's office registered 92 degrees. Within twenty minutes the temperature had dropped to 72.

"It was only a local thunder-squall," said Dr. Cline. Thunderstorms were forecast by Dr. Cline for today.

COAST BAKERS FOR USE OF RYE BREAD

Portland, Ore., Aug. 18.—Having agreed not to take back day-old bread, wholesale bakers of the Pacific northwest took another step in the food conservation campaign by starting the exploitation of rye bread as a war measure.

The bakers' move advises the use of rye bread for at least one meal each day, so that the supply of white flour may be conserved. In recent demonstrations various ways of using rye flour were shown to be most palatable and the food value of the bread also is said to favor its general adoption.

"If one of the three meals of the day were served with only rye bread on the table, the supply of wheat for flour would be increased by 150,000 bushels," said H. F. Pittman, ex-president of the Master Bakers' association.

LACK OF WANDERLUST GIVES HIM DISTINCTION

Cheyenne, Wyo., Aug. 18.—Among the notable pioneers at Cheyenne's golden jubilee and frontier day's celebration is Buck Greatrix, of Atlantic City, Wyo. Greatrix in 1868 settled at Atlantic City, which then was in Carter county, Dakota territory. In 1869 the territory of Wyoming was created and Atlantic City was included in the sub-division called Sweetwater county. In 1881 the county of Fremont was created from the northern part of Sweetwater county and Atlantic City was included in the new county. Finally, in 1890, Wyoming was admitted to statehood and Greatrix then achieved the distinction of having lived in two territories and one state and three counties and yet never to have moved his domicile.

FAMOUS COOK EMPLOYED

To aid the campaign to popularize Victor bread, the New Orleans Gas Light Company announced Friday that it would employ B. A. Perkins, famous cook, to demonstrate the preparation of a condensed product into food. The demonstration will take place before the housewives of the city next week.

TEMPORARY INJUNCTION ISSUED

Temporary injunction restraining the enforcement of the second ordinance passed by the city to segregate negro prostitutes from white prostitutes in the restricted district was issued Friday by Judge Skinner on the supplementary petition of Evelyn Martin vs. the City of New Orleans. The supplementary petition stated that since the filing of the first plea the supreme court of Louisiana has declared the ordinance unconstitutional, null and void.

The new ordinance No. 1485, passed with a view to accomplishing the segregation of negro prostitutes, is alleged in the latest petition of the plaintiff to be in violation of the United States and Louisiana constitutions, in that it is said to be in restraint of the liberties of the plaintiff without public utility motives to justify "pretended police power."

Laws cited by the petition as being violated by the ordinance are the fourteenth amendment to and Article 1, Section 10 of the United States Constitution and Section 5 of the state Constitution. The city ordinance is termed "oppressive, illegal, retroactive class legislation and violative of obligations of contract and vested rights."
