01 BIRDAS House (01/RA*) seen from Vitosha St,: reception facility for Plovdiv Municipality MAVRIDY House (06/RA**) a.k.a. LAMARTINE: wooden frame entirely substituted with 06 steel frame while interior mural decorations kept intact *in situ*. Unique case of such major intervention.

LAMARTINE seen from the West, towards Zora St. 06a 06b The winter in 1993 came early: November snow..

07 TCHERNOZEMSKI House (07/RA*): reception facility for the International Trade Fair, here seen from the backstreet with the restaurant entrance (this facade had been entirely demolished) and with the minor neighbouring houses 08/RA* and 09/RA*.

ANDREA GHEORGHIADY House (26/RA**) here hidden behind the greenery at approach 26

ANDREA GHEORGHIADY House (26/RA**) for the Bulgarian Association of Scientists is 26c squeezed between the rocks in a difficult North-facing lot and the exterior reveals little about the spatial richness of the interior = one of the best in the land. Main entrance, with the restaurant extending at summertime in the shade of trees

23 House at 14 Ivailo St. full renovation (interior / exterior) for residential purposes. Page 03 / of 14

39` CHALUKOV House (39/RA*) for the Journalists Association at the back of which a guesthouse wing got attached over the rock face above Djumayata Sq, here shows only its narrow Eastern facade.

39b Same as seen from 26 on the left =behind St Nicolas Chapel

DANOV House (42/RA**) courtyard at the front entrance is described further on Page 14 42a

GHEORGHIADY House from the previous page: main, Northern facade with the entrance; and 26d

Same, its Western facade is even more difficult to photograph; the fire-resistant strongroom of 26e the merchant built of stone vaults not seen behind the tree on the right

HINDLIYAN House (13/RA**) here seen from the approach from North, Artin Ghidikov St. Same, Northern facade towards the courtyard is two-storeyed only for the considerable slope 13`

January becomes at this point, so that the eaves from across the street almost touch = as in many other points of the Reservation; so that in 1920's the authorities slashed fire engine accesses through

20d Narrow lane from 13 to 20 (same as view 13g) with the SW corner of 20 visible

20e SW corner of 20 (explanation on next page) seen from the entrance to it's yard; facing West Page 07 / of 14

20f BALABANOV House (20/UV**, a.k.a. HADJI LAMPSHA, the Arnautian merchant who actually built this house while Balabanov demolished it in the 30 ... In the Seventies the authorities had a campaign for elimination of everything that might sound non-Bulgarian; and this deliberate misnomer is a gross case of ethnic cleansing.) To verify it's architecture, I have done extensive research through archive sketches, pictures, texts and through excavations which revealed it's "footprint" on the ground. Typologically the most unusual of all other houses in Plovdiv, it's *piano nobile* is cruciform; and the whole spatial composition complicated and monumental in a non-vernacular manner. Most of the intricate interior woodcarving decorations we added are the work of the renowned artist Atanas Zgalevski, now in SoHo, New York City, too. Now this magnificent structure –almost a mansion- is one of the most frequented venues on the Trimontium, host of chamber music concerts, of art exhibitions and community activities. 20h Same, in the narrow Fourth Of January St. 20i Same, here in view one rather curious element, common at that time here = the "klyukarnik" (that is, in free translation, the "gossiping" point where womenfolk would sit to take a coffee break and have a look up and down the street where they are not supposed to go without a major reason)

20j Unfriendly (actually, unfamiliar 10 years after my departure *ex-patriae*) attendants prevent even the architect of this re-construction from taking pictures = so I couldn't photograph the *piano nobile* upstairs, which is the culmination of the whole composition, lavishly decorated (read 20f) and took only these three furtive snapshots at the ground level, which do not reveal much, alas... Flash doesn't help much in wide spaces, and I didn't have sufficient time to bother with equipment and permissions. Same, view further to the right... 20k

201 Same, stairway to the upper floor (*piano nobile*) with entrance to everyday living rooms.

20m Same, the "klyukarnik" of image 20i again, from another angle.

05 House at P.R.Slaveykov St. (05/RA) for offices.

House at 5, P.R.Slaveykov St. (65/RA*) for youth hostel / guesthouse
First glimpsed in view 20c, page 06, STEPANYAN House (24/RA*) –here seen from the narrow cul-de-sac with the "klyukarnik" of 20i and 20m farther- features two most unusual elements: the one, clearly visible in the corner, is a flat rooftop of the first floor accessible from the second floor,

...while upon entering the well marked entrance door we see the other = a patio !!!, a real inner 24c yard with the height of the two floors of the house, open skywards and functioning as an oriental extension of the living rooms around, best visible on the second floor, next page.... Page 10 / of 14

24ď ...where this room has windows both towards the street and towards the patio. On the second floor the patio is adjoined by a sitting area with columns, rather than windows towards it, which makes little sense in this climate with summers hot, yes, but winters not too mild...

... a rather extraneous idea. Indeed, Stepanyan is an Armenian name; the neighbour to the North 24f is the Armenian Church St Kevork and the Armenian school.

This picture if folded at 90 degrees at the joint with the previous gives the full view of the patio 24g from the second floor.

House at 51 Stamat Matanov St (55/RA) is –once again because of the slope of the rocky 55 terrain- only two-storey high from this side, the entrance portico, while to the West its facade is 3.5 storey high. Now adapted for offices.

Same, the entrance portico is typical, with canopy supported by two columns 55b

Same, servants quarters and kitchen 55c

House at 7 Tzanko Lavrenov St (16/NU) is a new building for two families; while the 16 requirements were to blend with the surroundings, all care has been taken NOT to imitate the heritage and erect a "fake oldie": the loadbearing RConcrete structure is clearly emphasized.

House at 11 Tzanko Lavrenov St (19/UV) is a re-erected old house; but once again however, 19 cannot / should not /must not be mistaken for the real thing.

VITOSHA Street (54/UU) Archeological Site of the Prehistoric/to Bizantine City Wall of 54 Trimontium here seen with the three houses on top of it (50, 51 and 52) whose basements are integrated to organize a protective / displaying spaces. This work brought me the PLOVDIV'93 Award for architecture; see further...

50, 51, 52 (/RA*) combined have been converted to a two-storey school / kindergarten, with their frontyards integrated for playgrounds and with their basements giving protection and access to the archeological site underneath (and housing the kitchen and the heating boiler as well) Page 13 / of 14

50, 51 Same. 52 is the dining / kitchen and out of bounds for the schoolchildren. Load bearing structure, originally timber frame, has been totally replaced by RC (Reinforced Concrete) and new plumbing, electrical and steam heating installations fitted.

This is a close look at the quality of workmanship found in this Reservation = softly carved 55d marble of the highest grade is commonplace in Plovdiv (a.k.a. Philipopolis, after the father of Alexander the Great Macedonian); however this is outside of the scope of this brief Portfolio. Page 14 / of 14

42b DANOV House (42/RA**) : once again as many others, this house rides on top of the rock cliff (Trimontium, the name of the Roman urban nucleus, means "three hills" or, rather, three rocks of granite in this case). The Southern entrance portico at the back =42c; of which we had a glimpse 42a on page 03= stands only one storey high, facing (not without dignity and elegance) the mighty granite rock which looms twice that high to support the next neighbouring house.

House at 44 P.R.Slaveykov St (46/RA) is a fully renovated private residence, whose original 46 timber loadbearing frame -clearly visible on it's "twin" neighbouring building in the next picture-...

... has been entirely replaced by RC columns/slabs and modern amenities introduced while 46b retaining all the woodcarved doors, columns and other interior / exterior decorations of value.

Other works outside of the Reservation of Philipopolis / a.k.a. Trimontium / a.k.a. Pulden / a.k.a. Plovdiv =in the mountains, in the Regions and in the villages= are not covered by this cursory, casual two-day walking tour (deliberately sized down to what an ordinary tourist would be able to actually see and experience and take home); nor interior and specific mural / decorative works. For brevity drawings have NOT been shown altogether, nor Projects shelved for lack of funding; neither designs for clients other than the National Institute for Monuments of Culture, Sofia, nor competition works etc. So this Portfolio is to be continued at some later time....
