NOTICE.—The New Orleans & Carrollton railroad  
Company, now with us, that notwithstanding the  
police regulations of the Parish of Jefferson, a large num-  
ber of animals are allowed to run loose upon their road,  
which have already caused and are still causing consider-  
able damage to the road and the ditch on each side of it.

Bing on the eve of starting the Locomotive, it is apprehended that frequent accident will result from this abuse if not immediately put a stop to. The company having  
the right by their charter, section 11th, to protect the road  
against all injuries whatever, and to do all that may be  
necessary to the comfort of the residents, has ordered the  
voters of the parish that after publication of the present  
order, all stray animals which shall be found upon the road from  
the lower limit of the parish of Jefferson to Carrollton, shall  
be taken up and conducted to the depot assigned for that  
purpose in conformity with articles 33, 34 and 35, of the  
police regulations of said parish.

The public are moreover notified that it is expressly for-  
bidden to travel upon the road, either on horseback or in  
any vehicle whatever, with the teams comprised by the  
charter.
