Jonesouh Pacha - Jussoul Pacha was born in 1787, at Seres, in Macedonia. Being the eldest son of the celebrated \$10,000 Ismail Bey, he received a careful education and manifested early the most distinguished intellectual Endowments. The father's power extended over the Axans, and his military services, had given him great consequence. He ob-1,600 tained from the Porte, for Jussouf, at the centre of an immense trade, asthe English carried from the ce their goods 750 to the interior of Europe, in spite of Napoleon's decrees : and French caravans travelled from thence thro' Bosnia. Jussoufgot thus acquainted with Pranks and found that the prodigious amount of duties chabled him to gentify all his inclinations. He engaged in vast building schemes and improvements, in which a Frenchman, of the name of Ricard, was his factotum. Watches, arms. instruments, and books, were procured from Paris and London for Jussouf. He drank champagne and occasionally dressed in the European costume. Never had a Turk advanced farther in civilization. In 1813 Ismail died, universally regretted by Christians and Musulmans. Jussouf, who, according to custom, was superceded at Salonichi was compelled to return to Seres. There he continued his father's beneficence, and ruled with wisdom and gentleness. But his munificence country houses and barems absorbed immense sums, and receiving no longer tec seo, duties, he the war completed his ruin. At the very communicement of the Greek insurrection he somewhat the tide of Racha of Three Tails, which his father has constantly declined. He organized seyeral corps, and filled various offices without success, until he received ord rs to proceed with his Albanians to Varna, to join the Capitan Pacha. This was the last effort of his patriotism. Every hing indicates that he will never see his native country again.
