The independent members of the United States have recommended their faithful services to the public by rejecting their nomination to all positions which hitherto they had occupied in the United States Bank. On this ground (for there is no other) they rejected, on Tuesday last, the nomination of H. D. Gilpin to the office of Governor of the Territory of Michigan. Mr. Gilpin was last year reelected as a Governor, Director of the Bank, and then became, there were many who believed that if he were retained, he would faithfully serve the Government, and make a more useful tool of the Bank. Having received the mark by rejection as an enemy of the United States Bank, he can expect to be confined to no office so long as a majority of the Senate are at the same time in power. It is well known that the Senate should be assumed to be in opposition to him, and that the creation of a majority in the Senate should have this tendency, as well as malignity, to repeat the nomination of Mr. Vaneen, and yet it can hardly be expected that they will venture so grossly to outrage public sentiment so recently and strongly expressed.
