FROM MEXICO.
Extract of a letter addressed to a commercial house of this city, dated Matamoras, July 31.

"We have just received the official intelligence of the landing of the Spanish troops at Cabo-Rojo. This news is positive."

FROM HAVANA.
From a private letter, communicated to us by a commercial friend, we make the following extracts.
On the 5th and 6th inst. the long-tailed expedition to Mexico departed hence, consisting of above 3000 effective men, carried by seven transports (hired American vessels principally) and accompanied by one seventy four, two large frigates, two large brigs and two schooners, all well equipped and remarkably fine vessels of war.

The town of Dayton in Ohio, which in May, 1828, contained a population of 1697 persons, contains, according to a census made this month, two thousand three hundred and fifty-eight—making in 14 months, and increase of 661, or more than one third.

BALTIMORE, July 15.—Want of Sailors.—There are at this time several vessels detained in the port of Baltimore for the want of hands, and the current wages per month is \$15. We understand that the eastern ports are crowded with idle sailors, many of whom would find ready employ at the above rate. The highest wages at New York are stated to us as being but \$12 per month.

COMMERCIAL FAILURES.—A poor paragraph with this title, from a country paper in Louisiana, has been travelling at the North during the hot weather, representing that very numerous and heavy failures have taken place in New-Orleans, and that too among "houses of the highest respectability, and on whose solvency the most implicit reliance has been hitherto placed."

FROM EUROPE.
Paris, June 2.
Mr. de Palmella left Paris the day before yesterday to return to London, from which place it said that he will proceed to the island of Terceira, where he will establish a regency in the name of Dona Maria da Gloria. It is very probable that Mr. de Palmella will go from the island of Terceira to Brazil, according to instructions which he is to receive at London from the Queen Dona Maria and Count de Barbacena.

med by a person recently from thence that the wish, both among foreigners, and the natives near where he is stationed, is, that their favourite military Hero should become Emperor.—They both desire it, to procure quietness to the country, but more especially the former, as knowing the abilities of Santa Anna to be good; and his attachment to foreigners very great. He is a native of Mexico, and as you may surmise from his yclept name, considered very brave.

I have not time now to detail many of the considerations which occur to me, touching Spain and Mexico, but, before I close, must observe, that at a season when the demands upon our Treasury funds, which are supplied only by Custom House revenue, should be the greatest, the appearances of things, on the contrary, wear the most threatening aspect.—That is to say, it is reasonable to infer, from the recent occurrences with our "Mercaderes," or Dry Goods purchasers that the importation, for some time to come, must be greatly reduced. This body of men, have, en masse, appeared before their creditors, and demanded an extension of credit on their notes, amounting to about \$3,500,000 given by them, in payment for goods.

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The effect of mercantile failures is often very much overrated by persons at a distance, engaged in less hazardous pursuits. They are in fact but matters of course; and no more prove that a community is on the whole losing ground, than the frequent occurrence of deaths proves that the human race is becoming extinct.

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The Journal of Commerce says that the measure of establishing a regency in Terceira is said to be approved by the cabinets of France and England, and that a convention on the subject has been signed by the two Courts.
The Monitor of to day contains, in the official part, an ordinance of the King relative to the organization of the general staff in fortified places.
Yesterday, on Change, a list of Ministers was circulated, which an intrigue would put in the place of the present Ministry. In this list we find two Ministers of War, and two of Finance, doubtless to realize the plan announced by the Journal des Debats, of raising to 14 the number of Secretaries of State as in England.

Frontiers of Poland, May 10.
It is said there have been active negotiations between Lord Heytesbury and Count Nesselrode, respecting the blockade of the Dardanelis; that his Lordship, by order of his government, requires the raising of the blockade as injurious to the commerce of all Europe with the Levant, and unauthorized by the Treaty of 6th July, or in the subsequent arrangements. Count Nesselrode is reported to have answered, that the state of war existing between Russia and the Porte, and the wish to induce the latter to yield to the proposals of the Allied Powers, and thereby restore peace to Europe, had necessitated the measure, and justified its continuance; that the Emperor had nothing more at heart than to join in the efforts of England and France to effect a durable peace in Europe, founded on the former treaties, and as far as is compatible with the honour and interest of his empire.

Consequences of over-refinement in Pronunciation.

At a recent period of popular commotion in Ireland, three ladies, members of the Roman Catholic religion, happening to be in a remote and solitary part of the country, sent their servant to ascertain whether there was a chapel in the neighborhood, that they might attend on the following Sunday. He discovered a hovel devoted to religious purposes buried in a lonely place amongst wild rocks and trees; but it was so wretchedly provided in the way of accommodation that it neither contained pews nor seats. The ladies, however, were not deterred, and on Sunday morning they proceeded to the miserable hut, consoling themselves with the reflection that it was the only one in that part of the country. The appearance of three fashionable women entering the squalid and swampy retreat excited what the French call a sensation. The peasantry were astonished and the sacristan rubbed his eyes. The old priest, whose opportunities of acquiring the polite finish of polite society were not very numerous, put on his green glasses, then intending to be very fine and neat in his address turned round to the group of poor people that clustered near him, and exclaimed, "Boys, boys—three cheers (Anglic chair) for the ladies!" The boys at that time was more accustomed to cheers than chairs, so they took his words literally, and waving their hats and sticks, gave three shouts that nearly frightened the ladies out of their wits.
