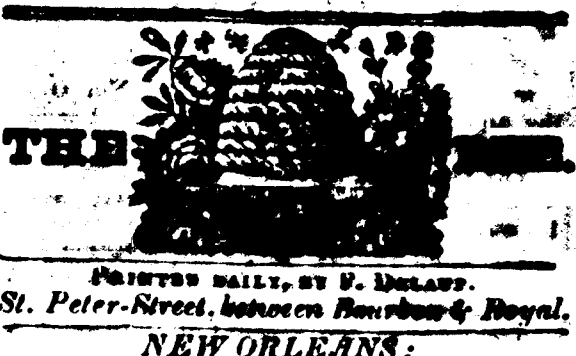

CRIMINAL COURT—February 26.
The State vs. Louis Gayarré.

Other attempts of assassination.
We had forgotten to mention in our paper of two other attempts which have been made upon the lives of our citizens; the one, on Tuesday evening last, at half past 8 o'clock, when Mr. Valsin Vignaud, of this city, passing at the corner of Bourbon and Bienville streets, was attacked by a ruffian who was skulking there for the purpose of stopping passers-by; Mr. Vignaud succeeded in beating off the villain by a violent blow of his umbrella, but not until after receiving himself three dagger wounds, two in the breast and one in the back, all of which are fortunately but slight.—The other was a young gentleman of this city, who was stopped in a similar manner, and who would in all probability have fallen a victim to the rascally intentions of an assassin, had he not have driven him off by defending himself with a sword cane. These repeated dangers to which our citizens have been exposed, will, it is presumed, awaken the lethargic negligence of the city authorities who are entrusted with the public safety of our citizens.

CONGRESS.
MONDAY, Jan. 26.
Mr. Boulligny, of Louisiana, presented a set of resolutions passed by the legislature of that State, which were ordered to be printed. The following exhibits the design of the whole:
Resolved, That our Senators in Congress be instructed and our Representatives requested, to exert their utmost abilities to obtain from the Federal Government a cession to this State of the public and unappropriated lands claimed by the United States, at as early a period, and on such terms as may be beneficial to the State and advantageous to our citizens.
House of Representatives.—The number of petitions presented this day was about 110. Particulars not specified in the Washington papers.
Mr. Carson presented the memorial of Doctor J. G. Nancreed, praying the establishment of a National Vaccine Institution.

Mr. Johnson presented the petition of Samuel Hall, who prays that a patent may be granted him for a new invention. He stated that after seven years close study and application, and the expenditure of a large sum of money, he had discovered, and invented a method of effecting the combustion of fuel in a manner perfectly new and more economical than any heretofore known, for the working of steam engines and various other useful purposes; and effecting also a great saving of fuel. It further observes, that the Lehigh or Anthracite coal might be used to very great advantage in the process.

LATEST FROM ENGLAND.
"LONDON, Dec. 11, 1828.
"My Dear Sir,—I have received your letter of the 4th instant, and I assure you that you do me justice in believing that am anxious to witness the settlement of the Roman Catholic question, which by benefiting the State would confer a benefit on every individual belonging to it. But I confess that I see no prospect of such a settlement. Party has been mixed up with the consideration of the question to such a degree and such violence pervades every discussion of it, that it is impossible to expect to prevail upon men to consider it dispassionately.
If we could bury it in oblivion for a short time, and employ that time diligently in the consideration of its difficulties on all sides, (for they are very great.) I should not despair of seeing a satisfactory remedy.

LONDON, Dec. 25.—Half past 7 o'clock.—It is stated from Moscow, under date of the 15th ult. that notwithstanding the abundant harvest of wheat, in almost all the provinces most productive of the article, prices have been maintained very high in the government of Arch. Tamboul, and others owing to the incessant demand kept up for the ports of the Baltic, and the bad crops in other countries. At the market of Amsterdam, wheat rose from 10.50 to 15 florins on the 16th inst. and considerable pur-

chases were made for exportation and speculation; other kinds of grain remained stationary.

It appears by the official returns, that in the month of Nov. 410,736 quarters of foreign grain, nearly all wheat, paid duty for home consumption, 414,266 quarters (of which however, only 104,991 quarters were wheat) remained in warehouse at the end of the month. The quantity of foreign grain actually introduced in November, and that remaining available for home consumption at the end of the month, make, therefore, about 850,000 quarters in all. Considerable importations seem to be still in progress, so that the aggregate supply to be derived abroad promises to be greater than under the favourable circumstances of the harvests of other countries, could have been at first anticipated.

BUST OF LAFAYETTE.—On Wednesday last, notice was communicated to the House of Representatives in Washington, that a bust of Gen. Lafayette had been received, which was intended for Congress. It is thus described in the National Intelligencer of Thursday:—
The bust is of fine white marble, and is the work of P. J. David of D'Angers in France.
It is of a size larger than the life; and exhibits a fine likeness of that distinguished Apostle of Liberty. On the front is "Au General Lafayette," and the name and residence of the Artist, with the year [1828] of its execution.—On the left side is an inscription indented in the stone, in the following words:—
"Lafayette's Speech in the House of Representatives, Dec. 10, 1824.—What better pledge can be given of persevering national love of liberty, when those blessings are evidently the result of a virtuous resistance of oppression, and institutions founded on the Rights of Men, and the republican opinion of self-government?"

On the right side is the following:—
"Lafayette's last words in his answer to the President's farewell speech, Washington, Sept. 7, 1825.—"God bless you, sir, and all who surround us. God bless the American People, and each of their States, and the Federal Government. Accept this patriotic farewell of an overflowing heart; and such will be its last throb when it ceases to beat."
As the bust was unaccompanied by any letter of presentation, we are unadvised to whom the Congress of the United States are indebted for this very handsome and acceptable present.

It was placed, by order of the Speaker, at the Clerk's table in the Hall, where it remained at the adjournment of the House yesterday.

ANOTHER FACTORY BURNED.—We regret to learn, that the Byram Cotton Factory, situated about 50 miles from this city, was destroyed by fire early yesterday morning, together with a considerable stock of cotton, and some manufactured goods. This was an extensive establishment, owned by several wealthy individuals of this city, and is said to have cost about 50,000 dollars. We understand the property was but partly insured.—
