

The mail, due Wednesday, came at hand on Thursday morning. New-York dates are of the 24th ult. Washington of the 22d, and Charleston of the 27th. There have been no late arrivals at New-York. By the same mail we have received our files of the Globe and Traveller; they contain no news but what have been anticipated by the Canada.

The schooner Alcida, arrived yesterday from Havana, after eight days passage. We regret that her letter bag was not deposited at the post-office. The European intelligence conveyed by this vehicle, may be of a more recent date than that received by the northern mail; should such be the case we shall impart their contents to our subscribers in the course of the morning.

We are indebted to the politeness of captain Brown, of the brig Barbara, from Marseilles, for a file of the Steamship up to the 10th of August. They contain no news interesting to the American reader. Brig Venus, capt. Dapassano, was to sail from Marseilles for this port between the 20th and 25th August.

We learn, from direct communication, that dissatisfaction growing out of Capo d'Istrias' crooked administration is daily increasing. The doubtful integrity of Pietro Vico does not seem to inspire the people with a greater degree of confidence. If they must have a king can the throne of the Palaeologi go begging? King Leopold has lost his vocation, in putting off the proffered crown of Greece. The "Hons of Mavrouni, and valures of the deep," are one of her popular bards calls the hardy mountaineers, and daring islanders, would never have played Belgium with their king, or whisked off before the effluvia of "Dutch courage."

New line of Packets.—A splendid ship by the name of Nashville, to be launched at New-York on the 21st of last month. It is said that the ship is upwards of 500 tons, and is to be commanded by captain Rathbone, formerly of the Kentucky. The other three ships of this line will be launched in time to depart on their regular days.

We understand, says the Kentucky Reporter, that a Mr Robinson was lately shot and killed by Dr. Pierce, the member of the Legislature, elected from Russell county in this state. The circumstances are of the most painful nature, such as need not be detailed, as the relate to an aggravated case of seduction, which resulted in the death of the guilty individual.

From the Charleston Mercury. The City Council have taken the subject of Cholera into consideration, and have requested the opinion of the Medical Society as to the true nature of the disease and the best means of prevention. Our Quarantine Laws are now in operation, and it is believed, are very faithfully executed. Should any additional measures be deemed advisable, they will be put in execution without delay. Although there is no ground, at present for any apprehension on this subject, yet it is the part of prudence to exercise salutary caution, and to guard against the access of that dreadful maul. No other consideration, certainly should be put in competition with the health and safety of the people.

GRANDTOWN, D. C. Sept. 20. A gratifying spectacle was exhibited to our citizens yesterday. This was no less than the passage of the waters of the river Potomac through the Canal into Rock Creek. Hundreds of thousands, flocked to witness it, and all testified by their countenances, as well as by their voices, the joy that was felt on the successful completion of this part of the great work which we anticipate is to bring wealth and prosperity to our long languishing city.

The Robert Kerr, Captain Boyd, from Belfast went ashore yesterday afternoon on the Beaumont Shoals, nine miles below this port. We regret to learn that 15 of the emigrants on board, lost their lives in attempting to get ashore.—Quebec paper.

The Schri. Industry, Capt. STEPHENS ROBERTS, owned in this city, entered at New-Castle. On her passage one of her crew sickened and died: the capt. and two of the crew were taken sick shortly after making the Capes of Delaware—additional hands were procured to take the schri. to New-Castle.—The attentions of the humane citizens of that place were immediately given to the sick. They were removed on shore, and the best medical was provided, under the direction of Mr. Jas. Booth, of that place. The disease unfortunately was too far advanced for any benefit to be derived from medicine. They were attended with that respect and attention that individuals are entitled to, who died far distant from their friends. The industry remains in charge of the mate, (the only survivor, and will remain at New-Castle until instructions are received from the owners.

Charleston City Gazette. The following summary and just view of this question, we copy from the Liverpool Times of the 16th August:

The danger of a general war which produced so much alarm only a week ago is happily passed away. The King of Holland has listened to the voice of remonstrance, backed as it was by 50,000 French soldiers and an English fleet, and has ordered his army to retire within the Dutch frontier, leaving the various points in dispute to be settled by negotiation. It is therefore probable that the Russian and Prussian governments, which were so strongly suspected, have acted with good faith in this affair, and have neither been amongst the encouragees nor supporters of the Dutch King. He has evidently acted on his own responsibility, or at all events on no better ground than a hope that the jealousness of the great powers would induce some of them to adopt his cause. It is not very improbable, considering the state of feeling which exists on the continent, that this would have been the case, if the Dutch had been protracted; the promptitude of the French and English governments has, however, saved Europe from the impending danger, by fighting the King of Holland into peace before any of his friends could make up their minds to rush into a war. The boldness and decision of the conduct of the two governments cannot be too much admired.—The best appearance of wavering or disunion between them would have given encouragement to the secret friends of Holland, and might have induced them to take no part in support of the Dutch invasion, would lead to an instant declaration of war on the part of France and England, has deterred

The Editors of the Journal of Commerce have been favored with the following extract of a letter, &c. St. PETERSBURGH, July 27. I wrote you last by ship Nye, which sailed probably yesterday. I am happy to inform you that the Cholera is rapidly decreasing, and is now no longer dreaded, having become so much milder in its character as to be within the power of medicine. About 7500 have been attacked in all, and probably upwards of 4000 have died, or will fall a prey to it. Perhaps many more might be added, which could not be introduced into the reports. Business is resumed as usual and every thing will go on as before.

From the Journal of Commerce Sept. 20. By the ship Roman, Capt. Lavender, we have received Canton papers to the 2d April. About 2 o'clock in the morning of 12th March, a second conflagration occurred in the Governor's palace, which destroyed the fire apparatus that escaped from the former fire on the first of January. The Portuguese Governor of Macao has given notice that he does not consider the edict prohibiting the residence of foreigners on that island, as intended to exclude those already residing in houses with the sanction of his predecessors in office. A letter received via Mexico, which we published some time since, mentioned the death of Chinese sailor at Dintin, said to have been killed in an affair with some foreign boats. The Canton Register of the 2d April contains a letter from the Hoppo to the Hong merchants on the subject, requiring the murderer to be ascertained and delivered up for prosecution. The register remarks that "no apprehensions are entertained of the amicable relations now subsisting between the Chinese government and foreigners being interrupted."

The rebellion in the North (Cashgar) still continues, and appears to be somewhat formidable. It broke out on the 24th of September. Troops were collecting from various quarters. Several skirmishes had taken place, with various success. In one of them, before the city of Yarkand, which the bandits were attacking, their forces were stated at 6000 horse, and 6000 or 7000 foot. Two adjoining cities were on their side. The Emperor had ordered 4700 camels to be prepared to transport the materials of war across the desert of Gobi, to the north of the mountains. This said the Imperial treasury is by no means well filled, which renders these occasional military operations very undesirable. The latest official accounts from the rebellious districts, are dated.

Peking, March 3.—On that day the Emperor published despatches announcing that the sieges of Yingke-shan and Cashgar were raised. The besiegers having fled on the approach of Imperial troops from Ele, accompanied by convicts acting as a militia. Some of His Majesty's forces took a circuit by Koten and Yarkand, for the purpose of hemming in the enemy attacking them on that side. The invaders were not, however, the invaders went off to the North-west and escaped their pursuers. Some struggles were overtaken, and either killed, or made prisoners. Notice is taken of the first party of troops which went against the invaders, under the direction of the civil assistant resident, all of whom were put to death. And, on the other hand a party of the enemy defending a position which was taken, were all put to the sword, and the officer who commanded is greatly praised for directing the soldiers to do so. At Yarkand a report, the survivors are to be liberated, and sent back to their native places, but placed under the care of the local magistracy.

PRATES.—Chinese pirates, notwithstanding the severity of the government, continue their depredations on the coast. On the 21st of the 12th moon, twelve men accused of this crime were decapitated, and on the day following, eight more suffered the same punishment, thus destroying by a violent death twenty human beings, which circumstance was as usual not known to a great majority of the inhabitants of Canton, and excited no sensation among those who did know it.

The imports at Manilla in 1830, amounted in value to \$1,562,922, besides \$178,663 in specie. This was done by means of 37 Spanish vessels, and 73 foreign. Exports, \$1,497,621, and \$81,952 in specie, in 37 Spanish vessels, and 74 foreign. Of the foreign vessels, 20 were American, 22 English, 8 French, 2 Dutch, 3 Portuguese, 5 Chinese junks, &c. Revenue from the customs, \$238,001.

KING LEOPOLD.—A humorous incident occurred at the village of Furnes, as His Majesty passed through, which is worth mentioning: a company of the civic guard had mounted guard in honor of His Majesty, and on his passing, having no muskets, they presented arms with sticks. It is worthy of remark that on the 17th of July, 1830, William of Holland made his last appearance in Belgium, and on 17th July, 1831, Leopold's first.

FASHION.—The faculty of Yale College, in their program, say, "it is particularly requested that ladies will appear in the house without bonnets, or come prepared to lay them aside." This was rather a bold stroke for the schoolmen, but they calculated upon strong ground. An advertiser says, this "magazine" means in full dress. "If it does, we are no judges of economy in room. Would it not be judicious to have a measuring committee appointed to visit the ladies, the "head form" of whose duty it should be to reform the bonnets or the sleeves, whichever should happen to require the most space?—Boston Courier.
