JUSTICES OF THE PEACE.

For the Parish of Natchill

Yesterday we referred to the meeting last Saturday of some citizens of the upper faubourg, to petition that two words shall be separated from the jurisdiction of the city corporation. The gentlemen present seem to have acted with more zeal than judgment; and been guided more by their passions and sectional interests than by a real regard for the welfare of the city at large, or by prodent reflections on the results which would necessarily be produced by such

If they have found reason to complain of the proceedings of the city council as constituted of a few members,-car they have less reason to think that personal feelings or bickerings will not operate in the administration of the wards separated? Even if those prejudicial propensities are not clisplayed or experienced, can they really suppose that their interests can best be promoted by different and differing corporations-probably less engaged in generous emulation than in sectional strifes and animosities ?

If they indeed desire the welfare of the city at large; and are desirous to obviate the evils of which they complain in their memorial, let them assist us in procuring a radical change in the municipal government: so as to have it a mended in some manner like the following.

Let the city be divided into eight wards as at present- and that justice may be done to every qualified voter in each ward, let them have the election of the mayor and the city conneil every alternate year.

Let the city council be composed of 2 branches—an upper and lower, or a select and common ; each ward to delegate

Let no ordinance be valid which has not separately received the approbation of a majority in each council; and

let every law be valid which has passed both-So far the legislation of the municipal government

The mayor should be elected by the people at the usual election for their representatives to the council—the candi date who obtains the majority of votes in all the wards hein successful. He should be head of the executive of the city but have no interference whatever in controlling or vetoing any ordinance or resolution of the councils. To his care should be confided the police of the city; and he should be empowered to take cognizance of all breaches of the peace, a an ordinary magistrate; and of all violations of the city or

For the better administration of justice in petty suit, a alderman (of the legal profession) should be appointed as justice of the peace for each ward, who should have cogni zance of all cases and suits permitted by law to a magistrate in the parishes of the state. When appeal are made from the decisions of the mayo

or aldermen, they should be tried by a jury, in a court specially appointed for that purpose, to be held quarterly. At this court a judge should preside; and the mayor and aldermen be privileged to sit with him.

This would do justice to all.
