If the constitution has already placed the senate as a check or control over such mominations, why should the house of representatives arrugate to itself that privilege? If individuals of the legislature feel chagrined or disappointed; are they to prostitute their delegated power as representatives to pass laws only, in ordir that they may act as public censors?


