Senator Mason Amused Over the Chal-

lenge of a Spanish Marquis. Senator Mason smiled and appeared immensely tickled at the suggestion of the duel between himself and "Senor Caterpillar," as he termed the Marquis d'Altavilla, former chief chamberlain for Queen Isabella of Spain. Another point comes to me at this suggestion of a duel, and that is whether a Spanish don, grandee or marquis is the equal socially of a Yankee senator. ## REMOVES A WOMAN'S STOMACH Delicate, Yet Successful, Operation

Performed in San Francisco. Dr. Charles B. Brigham, at St. Luke's hospital, San Francisco, made complete incision of the stomach of a female patient suffering with cancer, and 36 hours after the operation, she was resting comfortably, with almost a normal pulse and temperature. It will be at least a week, however, before there can be well-grounded hope of a com-

plete recovery. The patient is 65 years of age, and for the past three months has taken nothing but liquid food, and that in very small quantities. Dr. Brigham, who has been attending her, decided to make an incision with a view to possible gastrectomy or gastro-enterostomy, but, after finding two thirds of the stomach involved in the malignant growth, he decided upon complete incision. In this he was assisted by Drs. Boyd, Porter and Huntington. The patient was a little over two hours under the knife, the anaesthetic causing her no subsequent discomfort. This is the third operation of the kind on record.

Dr. Brigham conducted the operation upon much the same methods followed successfully by Dr. Carl Schlatter, in Zurich,, and his patient will be nursed back to strength under a similar diet. If Dr. Brigham's patient progresses as well as the one in Switzerland, chicken will be on her bill of fare two days

## PRESENT DAY BARBARIANS.

French African Expedition Said to Be

Guilty of Astonishing Cruelty. A grewsome account of the conduct. of the French expedition which has just made its way to the Nile is given by one of its members in a private letter, says the Boston Transcript. He says they impressed all their native porters and other help by force; in brief, seized and made slaves of them. Then, if any of them tried to escape, they shot or hanged them. When they came upon a village and found it deserted they set it afire, whereupon the inhabitants, who were hiding near by, would come back and try to extinguish the flames, thus giving the French an opportunity to seize some of them to replenish their slave train. The French would seize the chief and tie him up until he furnished the required number of slaves. If they did not succeed in calling any of the natives within reach by incendiarism or other means they simply looted the village. At night they kept as close a watch upon the slaves as possible, "but they would now and then all run away together, and it was not easy to kill the whole lot."
