### Captured Spanish Ordnance of No Practical Use to Us.

Our Ammunition Will Not Fit Guns, Which Also Are Not of the Most Modern Type

of Weapon.

There has been some speculation as to what disposition the navy department will make of the modern guns captured from Spain during the recent war. It has been generally understood that the obsolete ordnance would figure only as souvenirs for distribution by the government to states and municipalities, but there was quite a number of serviceable modern cannon, mostly naval guns captured at Santiago, Manila and elsewhere. It is stated by the department that these guns are not likely to form a very valuable asset The 4.7-inch guns from the Maria Teresa, the Viscaya and the Colon, several of which are now at the Washington navy yard, are not the most modern type of this weapon. They are different in caliber from any gun of the American navy, except those of the New Orleans and the Albany, now being completed abroad. The six-inch quick-fire guns captured also require special ammunition, not being adapted to our six-inch shells, so that, except ing her satisfactory, made her an offer in case of accident to one of the guns as a white house cook through one of of the New Orleans or Albany, there would be small likelihood of getting
