The following is the result of the election for a Senator to the Legislature of this State, which took place on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday last. M. Brownson 290 votes; Mr. Martin 201. John Brownson, Esq. is accordingly elected by a majority of 89 votes.

W. L. Brent, Esq. late Representative in Congress from this District, arrived here on Tuesday last, from Washington. Three steamboats arrived in our port on Monday last from New-Orleans—the Plough Boy, Rover and Lady Lafayette.

The bill introduced by Mr. Wyche, to mitigate the severity of excutions, and for the further relief of Insolvent debtors, provides, that for all debts contracted after the 1st day of May next, no execution shall be lewed on any crop whilst growing, except executions issuing on attachments.

The present session of the Congress will be one of great interest to the country, and already excites the anxious attention of the public—besides the numerous appointments made by the president, since the last adjournment of the Senate in the spring, and which will all have to pass in review through that body.

The manufacture of the eastern states will probably be the only ones who will in earnest seek any great alteration in the present law.

What course our government can pursue consistent with the dignity of the nation, should the French reject our claims, must depend on circumstances. Are we to make retaliatory reprisals on their commerce? or are we to declare war at once? or accept the mediations or interventions of some third power?

Public sentiment demands that something should be speedily done, and if we are to have a rupture with France, the sooner we know the disagreeable truth the better.

The decease of Judge Washington has made a vacancy which will no doubt be filled immediately, as the Supreme Court sit in a few weeks.

Several of the present members of the court are known to entertain hostile views to this institution, and should three ever be a majority of such persons on the bench, we may expect to see the United States Bank crushed at a blow.

The London Times of October 21st contains the following deplorable picture of the present condition of Ireland:—"By the last accounts from Ireland, the dreadful Cork trials were proceeding—and whatever may be the issue of them, as concerns the majority of the prisoners under prosecution, it is beyond all question, as we presume will be generally admitted, that a conspiracy does or did exist, more cold-blooded and systematic in its ferociousity than any, at almost any period within our recollection, been brought under cognizance of justice.

There is no illustration on record more palpable than that afforded by the trials now referred to, of the utterly disjointed or rather of the un-united condition of the portion of mankind, who, from simultaneously inhabiting Ireland, have been, for many ages, mis-called the "Irish nation."

Two series of traditions,—two creeds,—two systems of public opinion,—two codes of jurisprudence,—two standards of public good. In the case of the Dornaine conspiracy, there is not only no assignable motive for one of the most abominable conspiracies to murder innocent men which was ever imagined or attempted to be carried into execution; but we even find one of the witnesses on the trial, and one of the conspirators before it, make the following unblushing declarations respecting his principles (?) and intentions.

I took my oath that I would shoot Mr. Creagh, and undquibedly I would have done so, only for hurting my leg; I went out to kill Mr. Low, and only that Mr. Heagle was with him, I was ready to shoot him, I would shout twenty, thirty, or forty of them—would rather kill the police than the King's troops; I would shoot all the gentlemen in the county of Cork, and yet I am a conscientious fellow. It was a d—ble crime for me to take an oath to murder a gentleman, and I took it with all my heart; I would have shot the young lady in the carriage; I would not spare her.
