Passenger's Wife Jumps Into the Ocean with Her Children.

The Husband Follows Her to a Watery Grave-Cause of the Terrible Deed Was Insane Jealousy.

An appalling tragedy occurred the other day on the steamer Orion, as the vessel was making its way from Santos in Brazil to Genoa. Among the passengers was a family named Forrarini, the members of which were natives of Modena. The family comprised the father, mother and four children, who were returning to Italy with a snug little fortune which the father had accumulated in Brazil.

During the voyage Mr. and Mrs. Forrarini frequently quarreled, the husband accusing the wife of improper conduct, and she retorting that he was insane through unfounded jealousy. Finally in presence of all the passengers the husband made an awful charge in regard to the two youngest children, winding up his invective by saying that he would not acknowledge them. At this the wife became beside herself with indignation, and, catching the two little ones in her arms, she sprang to the side of the vessel and flung herself overboard.

The witnesses of this horrible act were for the moment petrified with amazement. Then the captain was notified, the vessel was stopped and boats were hastily launched in the hope of saving the three unfortunates. This hope, however, was soon seen to be baseless. The sturdy seamen did their best, but the sea had engulfed its prey, and the bodies could not be recovered.

When Forrarini saw that the search was useless he abandoned himself to despair, and it soon became evidents says the New York Herald, that he was losing entire command of himself. Consequently a close watch was kept over his movements, but he eluded his watchers, and on the third day after his wife had drowned herself and the two youngest children he, too, flung himself overboard and met with the same death.

There were now only two children ft, and when the vessel arrived at ienoa they were handed over to the care of the authorities.

#### WAS A GOOD FIGHTER.

Officer on the Retired List Is Nominated to Be Captain in the Active Service,

The records of the war department show an interesting story in connection with the nomination by the president of an officer on the retired list of the army, Robert W. Dowdy, to be a captain in active service. At the outbreak of the Spanish war Dowdy was a lieutenant in the Seventeenth infantry. As the troops were lying at Tampa waiting to embark he took his examination for promotion as a captain, but was found physically unfit. He was in the thick of the fighting everywhere, suffered every hardship and ex posure and went through the whole eampaign without losing a day from illness. Upon looking into the case the president was satisfied that this was a particular hardship, and that the man who was strong enough to render such service as Dowdy had rendered was good to retain in active service, hence the nomination.

# VALUE OF HAWAII.

Property Transferred to United States Is Scheduled at the Sum of \$10,873,406,

The president sent to the senate be fore its adjournment an inventory of the property of the Hawaiian government transferred to the United States under the act of annexation, according to a report made by Special Agent Sewall. The estimate places the total valuation at \$10,873,406 under the control of the various departments, as follows: Foreign affairs, \$60,625; interior, \$4,612.766; finance, \$18,399; attorney general, \$2,104; police, \$17,351; judiciary, \$80.097; public instruction,

\$501,163; government lands, \$5,581,000. The statement shows that of the public lands, \$4,147,700 worth of them are farming and grazing lands and \$1,481.-800 worth of them are town lots. There are 76,270 acres of coffee land, 25,626 of cane lands, 977 of rice lands, 751,177 of grazing land and 908,280 of forest

# . BIG DEMAND FOR ALLIGATORS.

Their Rough Hides Can Be Made Into Traveling Bags and Pocketbooks -Young Ones Best.

"There is an extraordinary demand just at present for young alligators," said Mr. Louis Herman, a well-known traveling representative of a large northern trunk manufactory, to a reporter for the New Orleans Times-Democrat. "Their skins are used for making a fine class of small satchels or hand bags. It requires from three to four skins to make even the smallest of these articles, and the consequence is that they are a good deal too costly for the general trade. There is as much difference between the hides of large alligators and the babies as there is between calfskin and Russia leather. The young alligator that is prized by the bagmakers is not over a foot and a half long, and the hard, diamondshaped scales that distinguish the older saurian have not had time to develop and harden. If the hide is properly tanned it is soft and beautiful, and resembles nothing else in the world. For pocketbooks, card cases, and so on. they use the skins of the little fellows. not much bigger than those that are sold for aquarium pets. It is a fad just now to color them a peculiar olive green, and the result is swell. It makes an excellent background for either gold or silver ornaments, and I have seen pocketbooks of that style quoted as high as \$100 apiece. All the skins come from Florida, and if the demand for the young ones continues, as seems quite likely at present, it is going to result in materially thinning out 'gators in the Land of Flowers. Heretofore the professional hunters have avoided the killing of the young, and there was no danger of the supply running short, as they are extremely prolific. But just now the old ones are allowed to go their way in peace, and the natives are devoting all their attention to gathering in the junior members of the family. Seriously, I anticipate a marked scarcity of the hides next season."

#### A GOOD HEALTH CLUB.

Organized at Chicago with a Physician at Its Head-Importance of Its Object.

A "Good Health club" has just been organized at Chicago and will meet twice a month. A physician is the president. Mrs. Eleanor Hutchison, he secretary, in explaining the object, said:

"In this age we seem to have lost sight of the fact that the building of our bodies and the repair of waste tissues is largely dependent upon the material we put into our stomachs. What can be of more interest to the thoughtful mother than the study of the higher physiology and chemistry of foods when she realizes that children get their morals from their diet, likewise their teeth, nerves, brain and muscles; that the character and quality of the material which builds the baby determines the character and fiber in man or woman. What should be of more interest to the young women among us who are to be the mothers of the future race? Our aim is to teach the importance of taking care of health in a imple and natural way, by an understanding of nature's laws and the careful and persistent observance of them."

# ANXIETY FOR WELLMAN.

Unless He Returns Shortly an Expedition Will Be Sent to Find Him.

The Morgen Bladet, of Christiania, says that arrangements have been concluded by which a sealing vessel will search Franz Josef land for Walter Wellman and the members of his expedition to Greenland unless the explorer returns shortly.

The Wellman expedition left Tromsoc, Norway, on June 26 last for the purpose of exploring the arctic regions and, after stopping at Solombola, near Archangel, the party sailed for Franz Josef land. On July 15 the Fridtjof, the steam whaler having on board Wellman and his companions, arrived at Vardoe, and, after taking on coal. the expedition left for the north on the following day. In the party are Profs. James H. Gove, of Columbia uniersity; Lieut. Evelyn B. Baldwin, Dr. Edward Hofina, Iuriof Harland and several Norwegian scientists.
