The bill passed by the House and under consideration by the Senate provides the following ways of helping pay the war cost, and the Senate committee is searching for more:

Smoking cigars, eigarettes or a pipe. Ordering either hard or soft drinks.

Riding on the railway trains, or sending a package by freight or express.

Using the telephone and telegraph or turning on the electric or gas light.

* Buying a motor car or a new phonographic record.

Attending the movies or baseball game, Buying a poker set.

. Sending a letter or package by mail.

Buying a package of chewing gum or joining a club.

Buying a diamond ring or a box of taleum powder.
