Two members of the Leesville company were attacked Saturday night by an unknown negro and stabbed, but not seriously at Morgan City. The negro escaped.

Guy P. Stubbs at Monroe Tuesday sold a thousand bales of cotton for \$124,000. In addition, the cottonseed brought over \$38,000.

John White, state's evidence in the Reeves family murder case, was sentenced to life imprisonment. Two have been sentenced to death and three to life imprisonment in this case.

J. Hurek and wife were injured when a storm blew down the house they occupied near Alexandria Monday night. No other damage was done.

Work on the Hammond postoffice has been delayed by the non-arrival of materials.

Dan Butler, a former Pullman porter on the S. P., was arrested at Morgan City charged with robbing the passengers.

Alexandria raised \$7,000 for the big Red Cross fund.

High wind and rain at Marksville Saturday night, did some property damage but vastly benefited the crops.

The Claiborne hotel at Homer has been taken over by George Neuman of Shreveport.

C. A. Perkins, charged at St. Louis with forgery, was arrested at Shreveport, escaped from the officer at St. Louis, went back to Shreveport to see his wife and was recaptured. Angola now claims him as an escaped convict.

For dynamiting fish, the Caddo district court gave James Barefield and John Harris, white men, fifteen days each.

Six young negroes, members of a negro baseball team, were drowned when a ferry boat carrying them across the Ouachita river near Monroe foundered with them Sunday.

Walter Chandler, aged 13, fell into a dry abandoned well at Shreveport Saturday night. Although badly bruised, he was not seriously hurt.

Charbon is said to be taking heavy toll of the live stock in Vermilion parish. Several cases have occurred among persons skinning animals dying of charbon.

A nine year old negro boy was drowned in the Ouachita near Glendora plantation Sunday. Farmers in Vermilion parish are preparing to get some of the cheap money by organizing farm loan associations.

ITEMS OUT OF THE ORDINARY FROM THE DAY'S COURT GRIND

The heirs of the late Mrs. Louise Luscke, residing in Germany, have \$25,750 coming to them from a New Orleans estate, but they won't get the money until the war is over.

Some time ago Henry P. Kowl died in this city, leaving \$25,000 for his sister in Germany. The latter has died, leaving a number of children. On account of the war Mr. Dreyfous has been unable to get in touch with them, and accordingly the money is in the custody of the court until the war is over.
